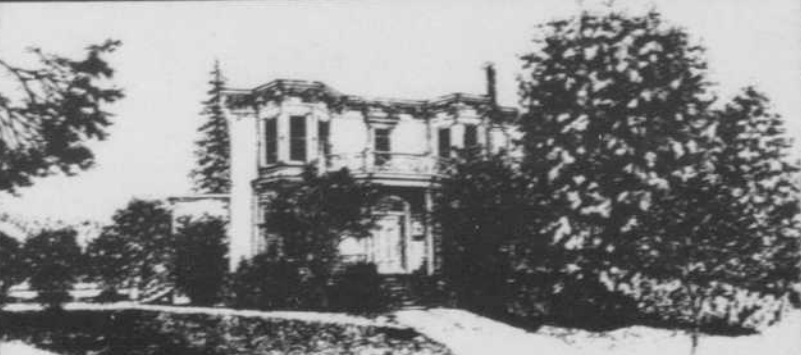

Signed theater planned

A special presentation of signed theater and music will be featured in "Celebration: A Theatre for the Deaf" Aug. 8-9 at the University.

Sponsored by the college of education's special education and vocational rehabilitation division, the free public performances by the University's sign language classes will be at 8 p.m. both evenings at Beall Concert Hall in the music school.

All of the production numbers will be interpreted for the deaf. They include acts such as mime skits, ballet and jazz dances and chorus line dancing and singing.

According to the show's producer Debbie Price, a visit-

ing special education instructor, the production was created to help people become aware of the deaf community.

"We want to provide an opportunity for the deaf and hearing alike to participate in a unique activity such as this, whether it's active involvement on the stage or through audience participation," she says.

"Signing can be a creative art form," Price adds. "We're providing students interested in doing some interpreting with an opportunity to do so."

KLCC receives grant

Radio station KLCC-FM at Lane Community College has been awarded a \$96,000 grant from the National Telecommunications and Information Administration, a division of the U.S. Department of Commerce.

The grant will allow KLCC to install translators to rebroadcast the station's programs in Oakridge, Florence and Cottage Grove, the main population

areas in the district not currently served by KLCC. In addition, the station's signal power will be raised to 30,000 watts. KLCC now broadcasts at 10,000 watts.

Grant monies will also be used to replace outdated equipment and to expand the station's production facilities.

KLCC Development Director Gina Ing says she expects the new equipment to be completely installed by the end of 1981.

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
