• A somewhat more light-hearted celebration will take place this Tuesday at Democratic headquarters at 857 Willamette St., where the "Democrats' Inaugural Brawl" will celebrate the approaching Republican Depression with a genuine soupline. Those attending are to bring their favorite soup or salad, and a 25-cents entry fee will make suds and wine available.

• For those who care to keep up on the latest fashions, the People's Inaugural seemed to indicate that the Mormon Church is beginning to give Jerry Falwell and Co. a run for their money for top spot on the local hate and loathing charts. The mention of the Mormon Church ("A financial corporation...The most patriarchal or-

ganization I know of," as one local leftist described it) was greeted with even more hisses than that of the evil California cowboy himself.

The crowd was cheered, however, by news of a legal suit supposedly soon to be filed against church leaders because of the anti-ERA stand taken by the church.

• Last November while campaigning in Battlecreek, Mich., Reagan left a message that could be pondered in the wake of the televised Ronald Reagan film festival:

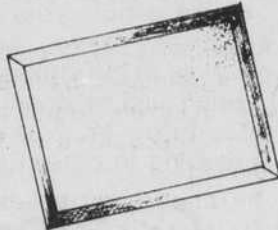
Ex-editor will speak

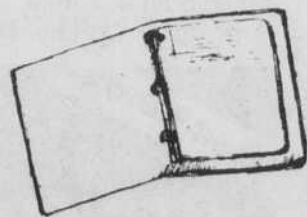
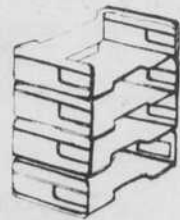

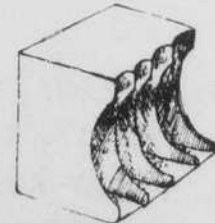
