Career Faire planned

Choosing the right career can be difficult.

"You've really got to know yourself," says Debbie Chereck of the Career Planning and Placement Service. "It is important to know what skills and interests a student has so he or she can choose the job that is satisfying."

The Fifth Annual Career Faire can help make that decision easier. Sponsored by the CPPS, the Alumni Association, the ASUO and Alpha Kappa Psi, the fair will be held in the EMU Ballroom Wednesday from 9:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m.

Students will have the opportunity to talk informally with professionals in 52 career areas divided among 12 general career booths, says Chereck, the fair's organizer. Sample questions will be passed out to students.

"It's a time for exploration, where you can ask silly questions," Chereck says. "It is not a job-recruiting situation."

Tables for campus organizations such as the ASUO, the Student University Relations Council and the Emerald will also be set up for students interested in campus activities that provide job experience.

Many college students are naive about career matters such as job requirements and everyday work experience, says Chereck.

"A big problem for students looking for a career is that they lack experience."

"Work-related experience is more marketable to employers and opportunities for this already exist on campus."
