Fooladi wins economics award

Iraj Fooladi, who graduated this spring from the University with a doctoral degree in economics, has been named the recipient of the Western Economic Association's 1981 Student Paper Award in the graduate division.

The \$300 award is expected to be presented to Fooladi July 4 in San Francisco during the association's annual conference. He has also been invited to read his paper at a session of the conference today.

Fooladi's dissertation, entitled "The Theory of the Firm Under Uncertainty," focuses on what economists describe as a "frontier" subject. It concerns how firms make business decisions when normally reliable economic predictors such as supply and demand curves become uncertain.

"The situation we're talking about is quite

common in our society," explains Gerald Beirwag, the University economics professor who chaired Fooladi's dissertation committee. "An example is the farmer who plants his fields, not knowing what price he'll get at harvest."

Fooladi's research pulls together the results of recent studies on the theory of business decision-making under uncertain conditions and adds several new theorems.

"It represents the latest word" in this area of economics, says Beirwag.

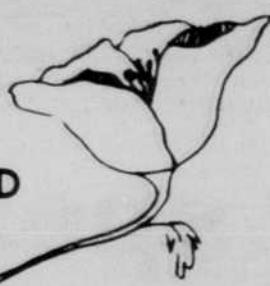
A graduate teaching fellow at Oregon since 1978, Fooladi teaches courses in micro- and macroeconomics, econometrics and statistics. He has been offered a visiting assistant professorship in economics at the University during the 1981-82 academic year.

A partner-supported program aimed at helping smokers stay off cigarettes once they have kicked the habit will be offered next month at the University. Starting July 8, the Oregon Smoking Control Program will offer sessions for smokers who have a spouse or partner who agrees to attend the group meetings and who wants to give personal support at home. The two-hour sessions will be conducted from 7 p.m. to 9 p.m. on Wednesday evenings for six weeks through August 12 at the University's Psychology Clinic in Straub Hall. A women's alcohol awareness group is beginning in July at Lane Community College's downtown center. The 10-week program, run by Drinking Decisions, Inc., is designed to help women recognize drinking patterns and to set realistic goals for changing those patterns through self-con-
