**Law school hosts seminar**

Lawyers and judges from around the country are at the University's School of Law for a month-long seminar on legal solutions to racial conflict.

The seminar's 13 participants, under the direction of law school dean Derrick Bell, are surveying and assessing the historical development of law in response to racial discrimination in the United States. They are also searching for new legal approaches to solving traditional racial problems.

A 1981 National Endowment for the Humanities Summer Seminar for Lawyers and Judges, the program began June 15 and concludes Friday.

While many solutions to racial conflicts have been tried, Bell said it is especially important to

evaluate long-standing remedies such as busing and integration, rather than accepting them as the only possible or appropriate solutions.

"In attacking racial problems, the important thing is that we are not fixated on one scheme or another," says Bell, a nationally known specialist on civil rights and desegregation law.

The goal of the seminar is to propose and evaluate a variety of possible legal solutions to the problem of racism in America and encourage an openness in searching for remedies in the future.

Bell says lawyers who practice in the civil rights field are often unable to examine long-accepted solutions to racial problems and formulate new

ones because of the long hours their profession demands.

And yet, he says, "persons with contemporary litigation experience can and should play an important role."

Bell has sought to give members of the legal profession an opportunity to actively fill that role through his four-week seminar.

Among the seminar's members are Judge Bush Mitchell from the Municipal Court of Dayton, Ohio, who as a black judge, says he is acutely aware of the black community's lack of confidence in the American court system, and Robert Laufman, a lawyer with a private practice in Cincinnati, Ohio, who specializes in civil rights cases.

**Library adds files of illustrator**

The University Library has added the working files of noted illustrator and commercial artist David Hendrickson to its Special Collections.

Hendrickson's widow, Margaret Hendrickson, of El Cajon, Calif., recently donated an extensive collection of original art work, sketches, manuscripts, proof sheets, correspondence, books and magazines, etching plates and a small etching press to the library.

The collection, appraised at \$38,500, is reminiscent of the work done during the Norman Rockwell era, according to Ed-

ward Kemp, the University's acquisitions librarian.

Hendrickson, who died in 1973, had a diverse career that ranged from the St. Paul Dispatch, where he worked as a sketch artist, to an advertising firm in San Francisco to a New York City art service.

He freelanced in advertising as well as in magazine and book illustrating. His work appeared in Colliers, McClure's, Redbook, Scribner's and Sunset.

Hendrickson illustrated two of the best-selling books of Lloyd Douglas, "Home for Christmas" and "Time to Remember," as

well as Joseph Hergesheimer's "The Three Black Pennys."

The collection is valuable for research, says Kemp, because it contains work ideas and sketches which are translated from rough to finished drawings.

"It is definitely one of the more diverse collections we have," says Kemp.

**Two alumni applauded**

Norman Walker, a certified public accountant and a 1966 University graduate, has received the Glen Porter Distinguished Alumni Award for 1981 from the University's Department of Accounting for his support of the University's accounting program.

Richard Perlmutter, a May 1981 graduate from the University's law school, has been named the first annual recipient of the Packwood Law Fellowship, awarded by Sen. Bob Packwood, R-Oregon, to a graduate of an Oregon law school.

Perlmutter will join Packwood's Washington, D.C., staff later this summer and spend a year learning the legislative process.
