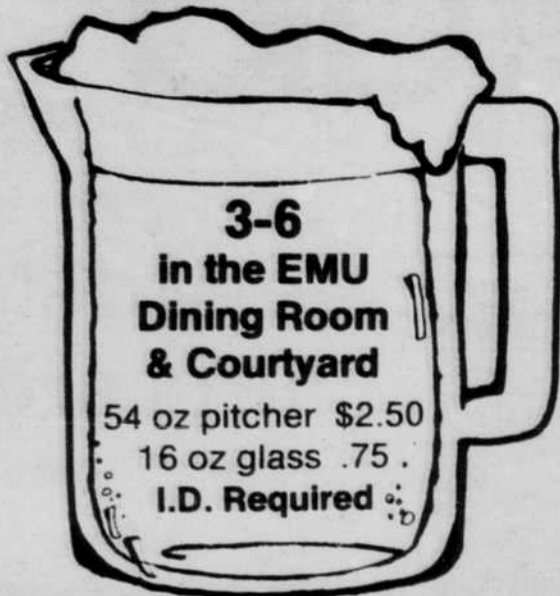

meeting. "I was not involved in the particular decision," says Zigler.

Skilern says the UCP board made the decision to ask both groups to leave Koinonia.

Gordon denies that the CORD eviction was politically motivated. She says the board has wanted to "have Koinonia filled with ministers" for years and that the possibility that the Methodists might move

provided an opportunity to do so.

She says the reason both groups were asked to vacate instead of just CALC is that "The basement is unsatisfactory for anyone to be in" because it's "wet and soggy and needs repairs."

Sherwood says the Methodists can't move until they have found a tenant for the Wesley Center, and the proposed move to Koinonia has caused a difference of opinion among Wesley Center board members.

"Some think it's a good idea and some do not. Personally, I don't want to go to Koinonia, but I can't say that we won't go."

According to Gordon, "It would be acceptable for CALC to stay if the Methodists did not come, but I'm not certain about CORD."

CORD moved out of its offices July 7, and will be sharing space with CALC until August 15. After that, if the Methodists approve the move to Koinonia, both groups will need to find another place to go.

Alumni receive awards

Two graduates of the University have been named co-recipients of the 1981 President's Award for Scholastic Achievement in the Robert D. Clark Honors College.

James Shephard, who earned a degree in general humanities, and Kevin Cassity, who received his degree in English, earned the award in recognition of their outstanding scholastic records and completion of distinguished senior theses. Both graduated at the end of summer term 1980.

The award, sponsored by the University Mother's Club, was

presented at the annual Honors College graduation reception in June. Each received a recognition citation and \$50. Honors college graduates from summer 1980 through spring 1981 were eligible for the award.

Shephard's thesis was titled "The Laws of Oleron and the Development of Modern Maritime Law." He is currently teaching and studying in the history graduate program in Poitiers, France.

Cassity's thesis topic was "K in Zion' and Other Stories."
