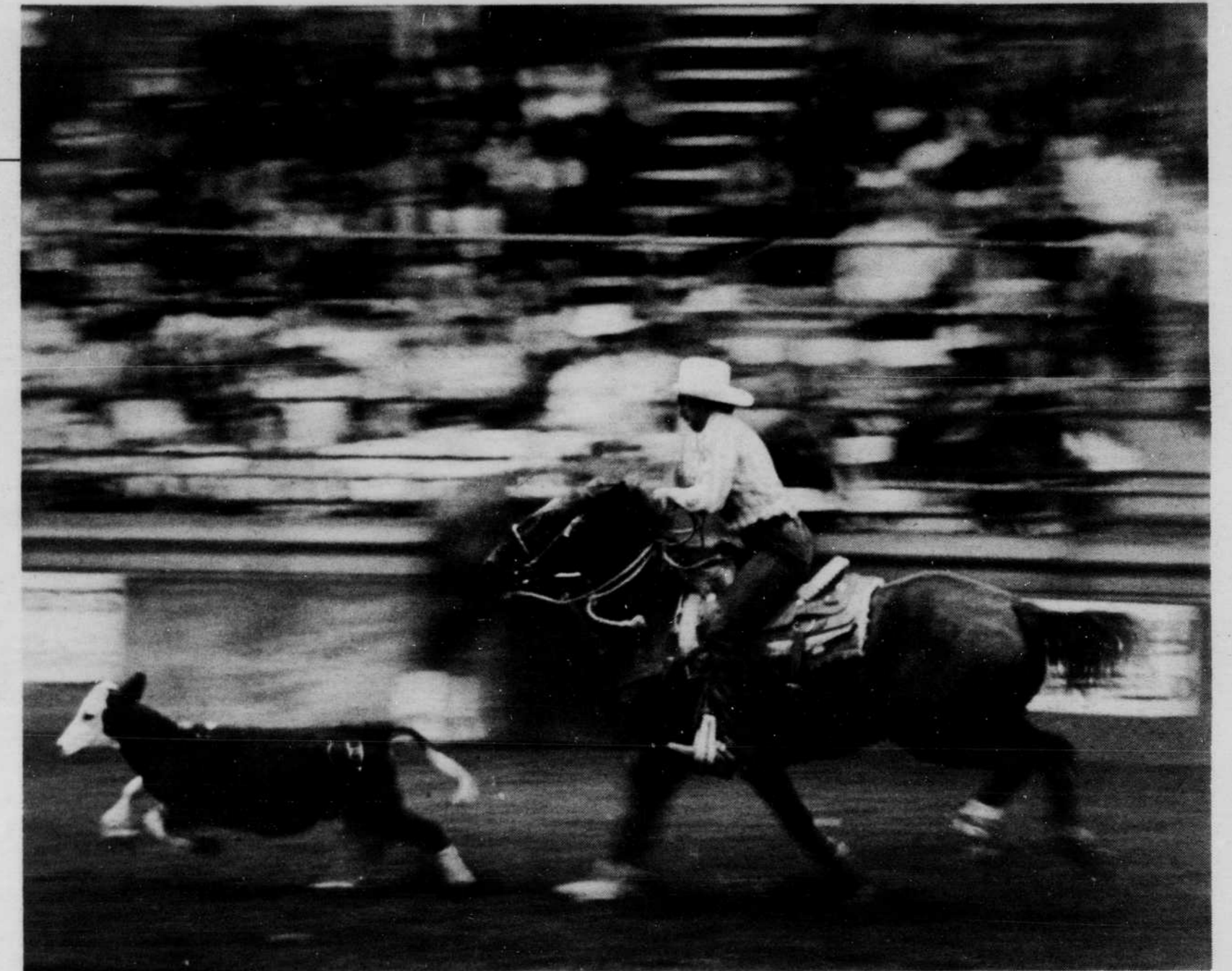
At the Fair, skilled masseurs, face-painters and hair-braiders drew the crowds.
