



# Emerald adds new strips

The Emerald introduces a pair of new comic strips in today's edition of the paper. Appearing on page two is Bloom County, by Berke Breathed, and on the classified page is Doonesbury, by Gary Trudeau. Both will appear Monday through Friday.

Peanuts and a local strip, Mixed Nuts, have been shelved to make way for the new strips.

Bloom County is billed as a "boy and his grandfather in a boarding house, along with the landlady, a recent immigrant, a widow and the worst excuse for a dog you ever saw, all plunked down in the center of deepest, darkest, middlest America."

Breathed, a 1979 graduate of the University of Texas in photojournalism, preceded Bloom County with a daily strip on college life, "The Academia Life," in 1977 for the University of Texas Daily Texan.

Breathed launched Bloom County as a nationally syndicated newspaper strip through the Washington Post.

The characters are:  
Ma Bloom — Owner, proprietor and chief coffee-filter replacer of Bloom's Boarding House. She's not dealing with a full deck, but who cares?  
Major P. Flynn — A man to have on your side when the Chinese land at Long Beach.

The Widow Rubie Tucker — A devoted worshipper in the early-morning Donahue cult. She's a paragon for Middle American battle-axes.
