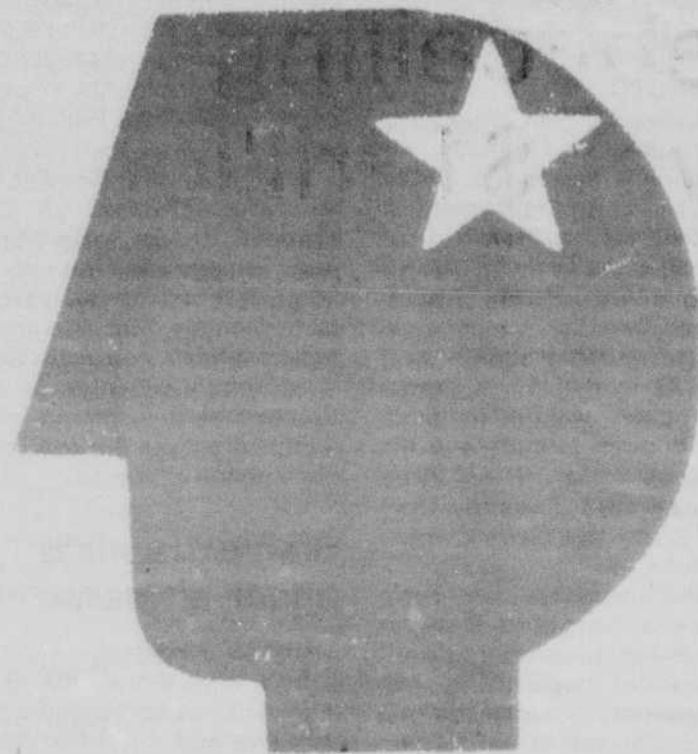
Inherit the Wind, Robinson Theatre, 8 p.m.
