Ducks break tradition

Oregon drops tough match to upstart OSU

"Volleyball certainly has changed in the state of Oregon," said Oregon volleyball coach Chris Voelz.

In the Ducks' point of view, it's a change for the worse.

Oregon broke with tradition Wednesday night at McArthur Court and dropped a tough match to a determined Oregon State squad, losing in five games, 15-11, 10-15, 15-13, 10-15, and 11-15.

It used to be that Oregon would beat its in-state rivals with ease, as it did six straight times last season. But it's a whole new season now.

"It used to be we would take them fairly easy, but no more," said Voelz. "Our exhibition loss to them earlier in the season gave us an idea that they were going to be more competitive."

The Beavers certainly were. They jumped out to an 11-1 lead in the tiebreaking final game, and then hung on to stop a late Duck rally to take the win.

"OSU played consistently better throughout the match," said Voelz. "They have improved greatly from last year, showing a lot of talent."

The Ducks themselves played well, at times even showing brilliance. But in the end, they ended up beating themselves with disorganization on defense.

Unable to regroup on defense, they cost themselves a number of key points and stopped their own rallies.

"Our mistakes became apparent whenever we were

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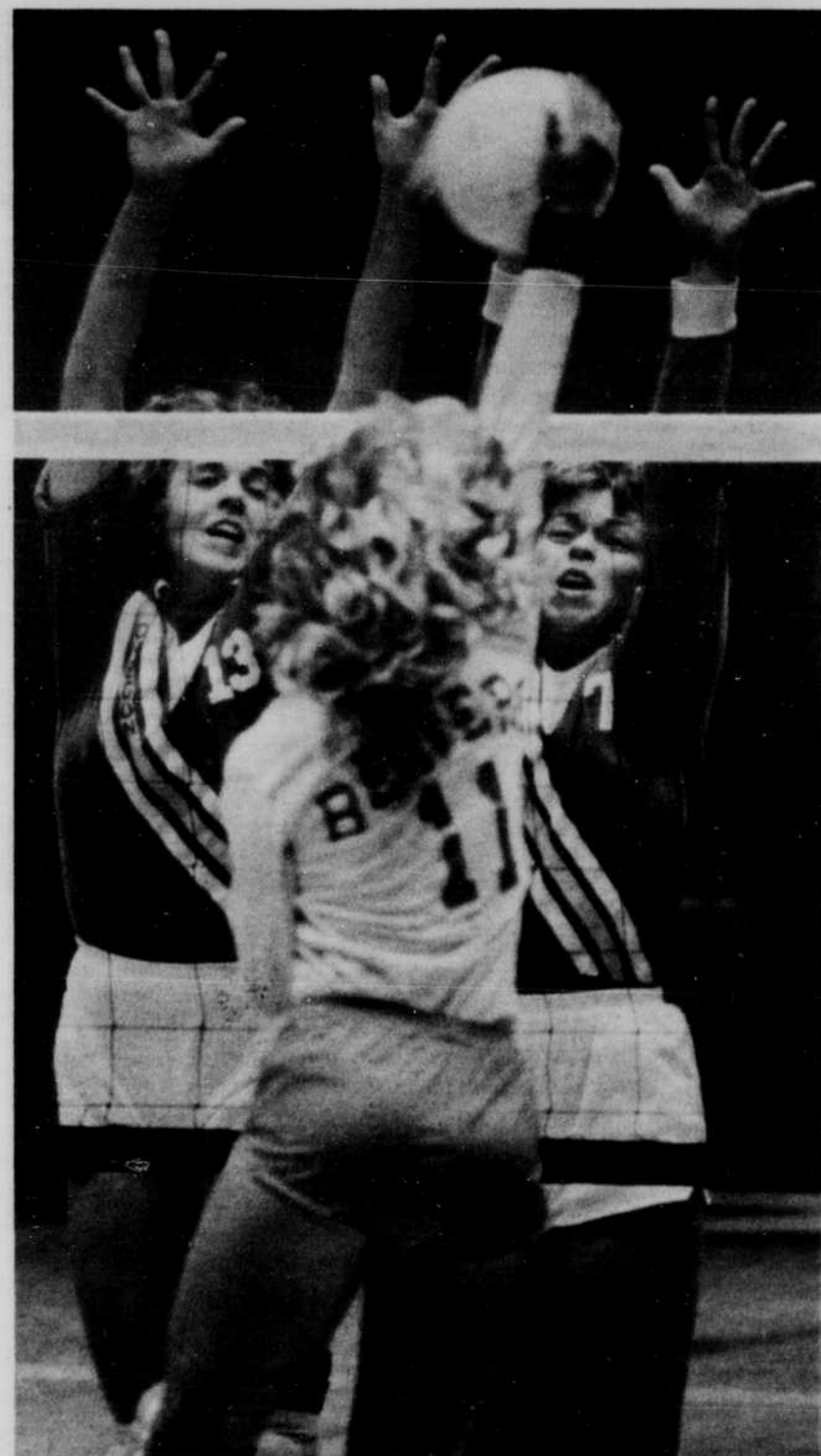
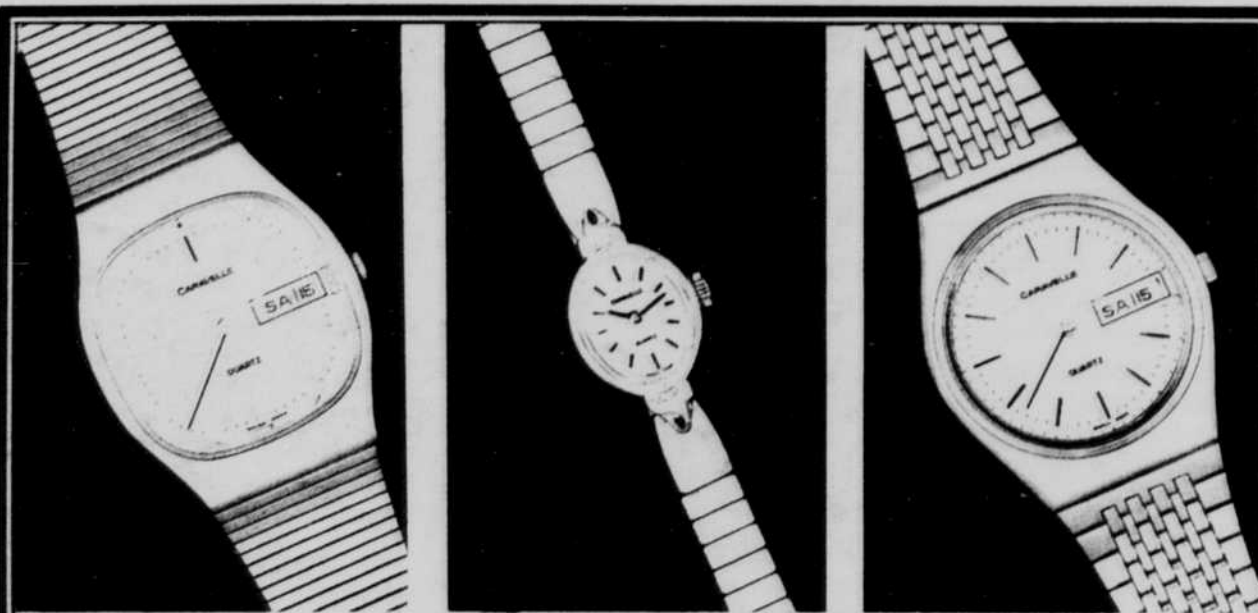
