"Fleeing Repression: El Salvador's Refugees" will be the subject of a public talk by Father Jesus Nieto of El Salvador today at 7:30 p.m. at the Emerald Baptist Church, 19th Avenue and Patterson Street. Father Nieto is a diocesan priest who worked for 13 years in the rural communities of El Salvador.

"Reconnaissance of Mt. St. Helens and Other Cascade Volcanoes" is the title of a talk given by Dr. Charles Rosenfeld of the Department of Geography at Oregon State University. The illustrated lecture, scheduled for today at 8 p.m. in Room 123, Science I, will discuss air and land based monitoring efforts which have been going on since before the Mt. St. Helens eruption.
