Minorities seminar slated for University

The fourth annual Willamette Valley Racial Minorities Consortium Conference will be held Nov. 13-14 at the University.

The two-day conference, held this year in conjunction with a statewide Asian American youth conference and other minority group meetings, is titled "Minority Concerns in a Conservative Era."

Panelists, papers and workshops will address a broad spectrum of racial minority issues and concerns. Proposed topics for the conference include Dissent and Violence, Minority Elderly and Legal Issues.

Jewel Bell, wife of Derrick Bell, University law school dean, will lead an all-minority women's panel on "Racism and Sexism: The Double Bind."

Speakers will include Eugene

Newport, mayor of Berkeley, Calif.; Lucie Cheng-Hirata, sociology professor at UCLA; Jose Gutierrez, political science professor at Western Oregon State College and founder of La Raza Unida Party, a national organization for Hispanic rights; and Felicia Hodge, executive director of the northwest Portland area Indian Health Board.

The consortium, composed of members from public and private colleges and universities and community colleges in the Willamette Valley, seeks to promote ethnic studies and other concerns of racial minority faculty, staff and students in the Willamette Valley and Oregon.
