# Speech on books honors library's golden birthday

With its rug-covered hardwood floor, overstuffed sofas and wood-manteled fireplaces, the Gerlinger Alumni Lounge was the ideal setting for a literary lecture.

This was the backdrop Monday for John Cole, executive director of the Library of Congress, when he spoke in honor of the University Library's 100th anniversary.

"The book is an important, anytime, anywhere, do-it-yourself, energy-free communication device," Cole said to the audience of about 40.

Cole devoted most of his talk to explaining various programs and ideas covered by the Library of Congress' Center for the Book.

Cole related a quote from one of the Library of Congress' librarians, Archibald McLeash. McLeash called the Library of Congress "a fortress of freedom, but above all else, a library for the people."

Cole said that those are still the sentiments of the Library and its staff.

"You owe it to yourself to visit the Library," Cole said.

Cole also talked about the Center for the Book, an organization he heads. He said the center is involved in several programs and campaigns.

One of the programs defends books against the their biggest competitor, television. Titled "Read More About It," the program is designed to encourage people, especially children, to regard books as a medium at least equal to television.

A magician, David Copperfield, hosted a program on CBS about magic. At the end of the program, he gave viewers the names of some books that would give them more information about magic.

Cole says the goal of the media campaign is

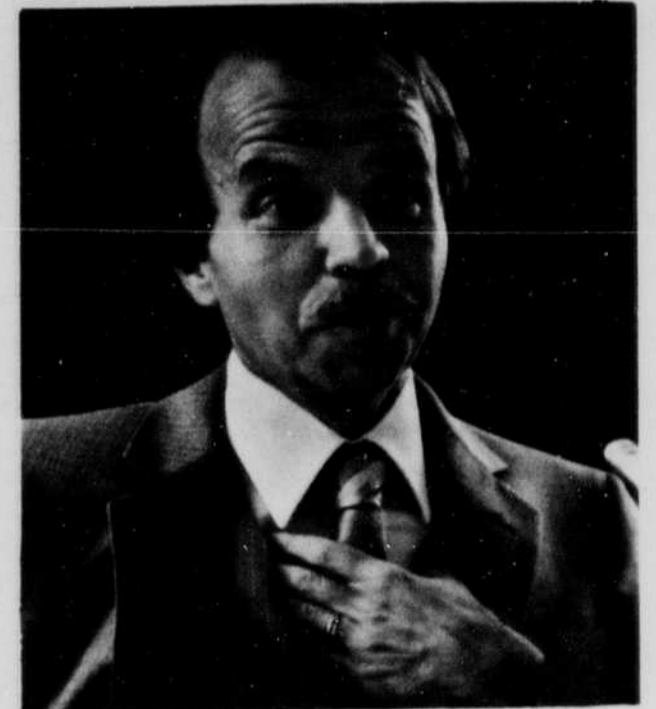

to provide access to books, not sell more books about magic.

The Center for the Book is also interested in solving technical problems involved in publishing, Cole said. "Believe it or not, we are trying to push book publishers into using acid-free paper in their printings."

The problem with paper that contains too much acid is that it becomes brittle when it ages. Cole said he hopes to apply enough subtle pressure to cause publishers to use acid-free paper.

## Wait between driving tests extended

Folks had better be well prepared before applying for a driving instruction permit or an Oregon driver's license.

A new rule, which went into effect Monday, requires a longer wait before retaking driving tests to help the Department of Motor Vehicles handle its workload.

An applicant who fails the

written test on the first try is not affected by the rule. However, if the applicant fails twice, he or she must wait 15 days before trying again, and if the applicant fails three times, the waiting time is 30 days.

The same restrictions, plus an additional rule requiring a new five-day wait between first and second attempts, apply to the

driving test.

DMV Administrator David Moomaw says the rule's purpose is to reduce the number of people who are "really unprepared to take the knowledge test when they come to one of our offices."

"The DMV simply does not have time to spare."
