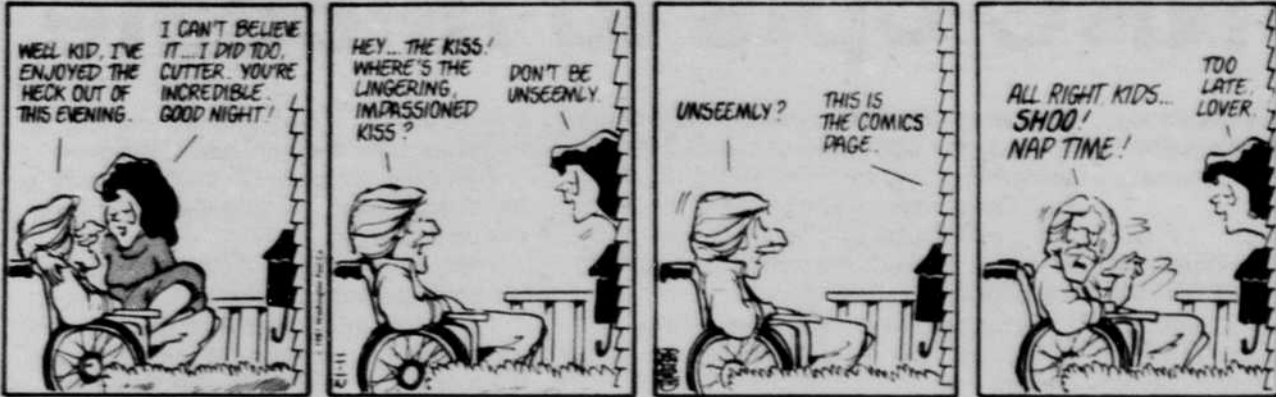

Group picks dean

Everette Dennis, dean of the University School of Journalism, has been selected to serve on the Committee of Ninety being assembled to celebrate the 90th birthday of Edward Bernays, the founder of public relations.

The gala celebration for Bernays, who is regarded as the nation's first "counsel on public relations," will be held in Boston at the Harvard Club on Nov. 22.

Bernays, the nephew of Sigmund Freud, was an advisor to presidents from Woodrow Wilson to Dwight Eisenhower. He helped shape the public image of American business and government for nearly 70 years. He also taught the first

university course in public relations in the 1920s and wrote the first book on the subject.

Dennis became acquainted with Bernays while on a sabbatical leave at the Harvard Law School in 1978.

He calls Bernays "a remarkable time traveller with extraordinary insights on the forces that have shaped the 20th century. He was with Wilson at Versailles, helped popularize ballet in America, advised corporate leaders, pushed for agricultural innovations and much, much more."

Members of the Committee of Ninety include persons from the arts, education, government, business and the mass media.

Asian American issues will be addressed at a statewide Asian American youth conference slated for Friday and Saturday at the University. All events will be held at the EMU and are open to the public without charge. Friday's schedule, which begins at 8:30 a.m. in the EMU Forum, includes a series of films, video tapes and slide shows. Among them is "Memoirs 1941-45," a slide presentation of the Japanese internment camps in the United States during World War II, to be shown at 4 p.m. Keynote speaker is Warren Furutani, an activist who has spoken widely on Asian American issues. He will discuss the history of the Asian American movement at 9:30 a.m. Saturday in the EMU Forum Room. The conference also will include a concert at 8 p.m. Saturday featuring Warriors of the Rainbow, a Los Angeles-based touring musical group. The concert, titled "Breaking Out," will feature original Asian American music by lyricist Nobuko Miyamoto and composer Benny Yee. Their music will be interwoven with film, slides, dance and audience participation.
