Snow expected to continue today

A lingering storm plagued Oregon travelers Monday with intermittent snow, rain, sleet and icing conditions, resulting in one death.

Oregon has had snow, off and on, at lower elevations since early Friday. Bend in Central Oregon had accumulated about two feet of snow since last week.

Western Oregon, including the coast, received its heaviest snowfall Sunday night.

The National Weather Service predicted more snow and rain for most of the state, with slightly lower temperatures — below 30 for Western Oregon and below 20 in Eastern Oregon.

Icy conditions were blamed by police in Corvallis for the death of Bonnie Vitelli, 31, Corvallis. A car in which she was driving skidded on black ice and collided with another car on Oregon 99.

Interstate 5 over the Siskiyou Summit near the Oregon-California border was reopened Monday morning after being closed Sunday afternoon because of a snowy blizzard.

U.S. 20 over the Cascades from the Willamette Valley to Bend remained closed Monday night after being blocked Sunday afternoon. The highway also was blocked by snow in the Burns area of Eastern Oregon.

U.S. 26 in the Mount Hood

area and Oregon 58 over the Cascades east of Eugene were reopened.

Traction devices were required on nearly all the mountain passes.

Suspected terrorists freed amid gunfire

ROME

Premier Giovanni Spadolini's government came under sharp attack in Parliament Monday over the escape of four suspected terrorists from a women's prison.

Politicians and newspapers expressed astonishment that the escape could take place in an area under heavy security surveillance as part of the police search for kidnapped U.S. Brig. Gen. James Dozier.

The four women escaped Sunday after accomplices blasted a hole in the concrete wall of the prison in Rovigo, near Venice, tossed them sub-machine guns and kept sentries at bay with automatic weapons fire.

A passer-by was killed and six others were wounded by the blast from explosives packed in a car alongside the wall.

Police were investigating the possibility that the escape was an attempt by the Red Brigades urban terrorists to divert police forces from investigating their Dec. 17 kidnapping of Dozier in Verona.

Police set up roadblocks around Rovigo and combed nearby areas in northern Italy for the women and their accomplices, who fled in two waiting cars. There were reported to be at least four accomplices.

Common Market support sanctions

BRUSSELS, Belgium

Ten western European governments promised Monday they won't undermine economic sanctions the United States imposed on the Soviet Union following declaration of martial law in Poland.

But the Common Market countries failed to reach agreement on their own unified response to the situation in Poland.

Foreign ministers of the 10 Common Market countries issued a declaration pledging to "avoid any step which could compromise" anti-Soviet sanctions announced last week by Pres. Reagan, who said the Soviet Union was responsible for martial law in Poland.

The promise was aimed at assuring the United States that European countries would not fill the gap in sales of high technology equipment or other items on a list of goods Reagan banned for export to the Soviet Union.

"Europe will do nothing in any area that might undermine the action of other countries," said Belgian Foreign Minister Leo Tindemans, as spokesman for the 10 ministers.

He said the ministers met privately for seven hours to discuss the possibility of imposing their own commercial restrictions on the Soviet Union and cutting off food and financial aid to Poland. But the governments of Britain and West Germany already had formally opposed economic sanctions as ineffective.
