Men win, women lose to OSU

Mark Bennett paced the Oregon men's swimming team with two first place finishes as the Ducks won the aquatic Civil War over Oregon State, 54-32, at Leighton Pool Friday. Meanwhile, OSU's Holly Andrus led the Beavers with two first-place finishes and a third-place finish to beat the Oregon women, 80-33.

Bennett scored firsts in the 200 individual medley (2:04.06) and the 100 freestyle (50.05). Andrus placed victories in the 200 freestyle (2:05.47) and the 500 freestyle (5:42.52) while taking third in the 200 individual medley (2:04.74).

In addition, the Duck men swept the diving competition, with Ted Colombo and Dave Fleming going 1-2 in the 1 and 3 meter diving events.

The Oregon men ran their dual meet record to 2-0 with an earlier victory over Linfield, and the women are now 1-1, also having bested Linfield.

The next co-ed dual meet for the Ducks will be Sat., Jan. 15, at 6:30 p.m. against Sacramento State in Leighton Pool.

Gymnasts open with win, loss

Oregon's women's gymnastics team opened its 1982 season as expected, breezing to a 128.95-120.55 win over out-manned Seattle Pacific on Friday before falling to a highly touted Oregon State team, 142.80-126.65, on Saturday.

Oregon coach Gary Vanderhoef had gotten word from his assistants that Seattle Pacific would not present a problem for the Ducks, and that turned out to be the case. Senior Sara Gustafson led the way for Oregon, taking firsts in the vault, uneven bars and balance beam en route to winning the all-around competition with a score of 33.15.

She was backed by two freshmen, Jerri Frazer and Julie Tennenhouse, who took second

and third in the all-around respectively.

"I was pleased with the way we went after it," said first-year coach Vanderhoef, "and Maureen Nolan did a super job on the bars."

Nolan, who took second on the bars with a score of 8.05, was not so sure. "I think there's definitely room for improvement," she said.

Things were different against Oregon State, the nation's third best team a year ago. The Beavers' depth showed against the Ducks as they swept the top four places in three of the four events. All-American Mary Ayotte paced OSU with firsts in the uneven bars and floor exercise and a top score of 36.70 in all-around, while Gustafson's

fifth-place score of 32.30 was the best the Ducks could muster.

Second place in the all-around went to OSU's Jayne Weinstein, who prepped at the National Academy of Artistic Gymnastics in Eugene, yet got away from Vanderhoef and Oregon. "I think she wanted to come here," said Vanderhoef, "but at the last moment..."

It was a disappointing meet for Oregon. Vanderhoef had hoped to stay within five points of the Beavers, but instead had to settle for a 16 point difference and a dual meet record of 1-1.

Oregon's next meet will be on January 15 against the same Seattle Pacific team they opened against, this time in Seattle.

It's the Bengals vs. S.F.

Frantic drive boosts 49ers; Cincinnati breezes S.D.

Joe Montana threw his third touchdown pass of the game with 51 seconds to play, carrying the Cinderella San Francisco 49ers to a 28-27 victory over the Dallas Cowboys in the National Football Conference championship game Sunday.

The victory sent the 49ers into Super Bowl XVI against American Conference champion Cincinnati on Sunday, Jan. 24 at the Silverdome in Pontiac, Mich. Ken Anderson threw two touchdown passes as the Cincinnati Bengals, playing near-perfect football despite bitter cold, beat the mistake-prone San Diego Chargers 27-7 Sunday for the American Conference championship.

It will mark the first time since Super Bowl III that two teams with no experience in this game will meet for the National Foot-

ball League championship.

Montana staged a frantic drive downfield, climaxing it with a 6-yard touchdown pass to wide receiver Dwight Clark, who led the NFC in pass receiving during the regular season. Ray Wersching then added the vital extra point that clinched the victory for San Francisco.

Six turnovers had kept the 49ers in trouble much of the afternoon, and Dallas had rallied for 10 fourth-quarter points to seize the lead at 27-21.

Anderson, the National Football League's passing champion, Most Valuable Player and Offensive Player of the Year, hit M.L. Harris with an 8-yard scoring pass midway through the first quarter, giving Cincinnati a 10-0 lead, then sealed the victory with a 3-yard TD pass to reserve tight end Don Bass with 6:52 to play.

Bass had helped set up An-

der's first scoring pass, recovering a fumble on a kickoff by San Diego's James Brooks after Jim Breech had put the Bengals on the scoreboard with a 31-yard field goal.

Breech also connected from 38 yards after a holding penalty wiped out a Steve Kreider touchdown run on a fake field goal, and Pete Johnson bulled in from 1 yard out for Cincinnati's other scores.

The Chargers' only touchdown came on Dan Fouts' pass to tight end Kellen Winslow, a play covering 33 yards, in the second quarter.

It was the only time this season the high-powered Chargers had been held to less than 17 points.

Fouts completed 15 of 28 passes for 185 yards and was intercepted twice on consecutive San Diego drives late in the second quarter.
