

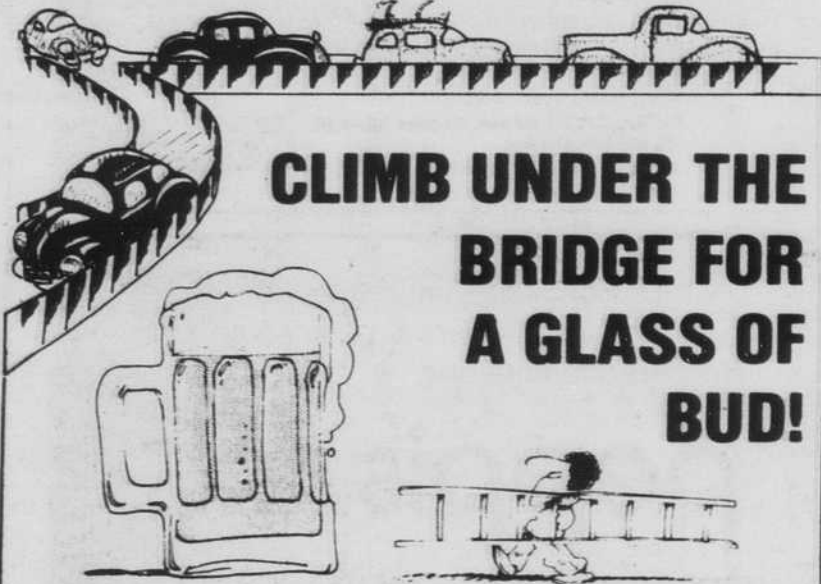

SF, Cincy meet media

49ers say they're no fluke; Bengals like the dome

PONTIAC, Mich. (AP) — Have the youthful **San Francisco 49ers** arrived at Super Bowl XVI by playing over their heads? Linebacker Jack "Hacksaw" Reynolds says it's hard to tell.

The former Los Angeles Rams' star, signed by the 49ers as a free agent prior to the season, said Tuesday that even with 12 years experience in the National Football League he finds it difficult to account for San Francisco's turnaround.

Tuesday, both the 49ers and their opponents, the Cincinnati Bengals, met with members of the media flocking to Detroit.

"I just don't know. I don't know if they're lucky, good or a combination of both. It's too early to say," said Reynolds, a two-time Pro Bowler.

"You've seen so many teams go along and do really well and just fall to pieces. The real test for this team will come next year."

Quarterback **Joe Montana** took issue with Dallas Coach Tom Landry's contention that the 49ers were a one-player team. After the 49ers beat the Cowboys for the National Football Conference title, Landry said: "Montana has to be the key. There really is nothing else there except him."

"I cannot agree with that," said Montana, the NFC's leading passer. "I think we're playing together as a unit and not just one person."

Wide receiver **Dwight Clark**, whose last-minute touchdown catch stunned Dallas, feels the 49ers are playing up to their capabilities — not over their heads.

"It's kind of hard to believe anyone would say that after we won 13 games in the regular season," said Clark, the NFC's leading receiver.

Montana pointed to several games he called

keys to the 49ers' breakthrough from a team that was 6-10 last season to one that posted the NFL's best record this year.

"But I think the one that kind of set us into the idea that we had a real big possibility (of going all the way)" was when Ray Wersching kicked a 37-yard field goal with no time remaining to beat the Rams 33-31 at Los Angeles Nov. 22.

Playing in wintry onslaughts is more their style, but the Cincinnati Bengals haven't yet suggested that they roll back the Silverdome roof for Super Bowl XVI.

The American Conference champions worked out for 1½ hour in the controlled Silverdome climate Tuesday and found it strange going.

The Bengals earned a cold-weather reputation with their show of bravado in the AFC championship game. With some of the players wearing short sleeves, the Bengals thrashed the San Diego Chargers 27-7 at Riverfront Stadium as wind-chills made it feel like 59 degrees below zero.

Temperatures moderated only slightly for the Bengals' outdoor workouts in Cincinnati last week, making their workout in the domed stadium feel like a visit to the tropics.

Although punter **Pat McInally** led the National Football League in kicking average despite the stiff winds of southwest Ohio, he was enthralled Tuesday by the chance to practice indoors.

"This is going to be enjoyable because I had about eight weeks of kicking bricks," said McInally, who averaged 45.4 yards per punt. "I had to change my style and become more compact. I was just worried about making contact with the ball. I'm looking forward to cutting loose today."

Hawks stop Blazer rally in 112-101 win

ATLANTA (AP) — John Drew scored 26 points and Eddie Johnson added 23 as the Atlanta Hawks fought off a Portland comeback and defeated the Trail Blazers 112-101 in National Basketball Association play Tuesday night.

The Hawks led by 35 points, 94-59, with 47 seconds remaining in the third quarter but saw their lead dwindle to six, 97-91, with 5:50 remaining in the game.

Portland outscored Atlanta 30-3 over the first 6:10 of the fourth period, with Darnell Valentine scoring 14 for the Blazers and Billy Ray Bates adding nine during the drive. Atlanta managed only three points on three free throws during the Blazer charge.

Bates led Portland with 22 points.
