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Gymnast coaches clash

Oregon's women's gymnastics team will get a whirlwind tour of the Bay area this weekend as they meet San Francisco State on Friday, Stanford and USC in Palo Alto on Saturday and Cal and USC on Sunday afternoon in Berkeley.

But as the team leaves Eugene this morning, they'll exit amidst controversy.

Jeff Davis has quit his position as assistant coach, apparently due to a difference of opinion with Sue Vanderhoef, wife of head coach Gary Vanderhoef, during a practice session last Friday. Vanderhoef's wife had been filling in for him after he suffered a back injury.

Davis was not available for comment, but Vanderhoef, who will resume his coaching duties next week, described Davis as, "a guy that had some problems. He didn't follow instructions, and he created a negative atmosphere for the team."

A team member reported that Davis and Vanderhoef had clashed at times during the season. She said that the team was quite upset over what had happened, but added that the incident has brought the girls on the squad closer together.

Against their upcoming opponents, the Ducks should face some stern tests over the

weekend. Friday, San Francisco State is the opponent, and assistant coach Kurt Krichko called SFS, "a team with the caliber of a UC-Davis. They are a good Division III team — we'll use the meet as a warm-up for the rest of the weekend meets."

Next are Stanford and USC, and Oregon will have its hands full. The Cardinals have scored in the 142s already this season (against Oregon State) and possess one of the top all-arounders in the nation in Marilyn Chapman. The Trojans, meanwhile, were ranked eighth in the nation in the pre-season polls.

Sunday it will be Cal and USC, and Krichko says that the Bears, "do not have much depth team-wise. We should beat them, and we should beat USC."

Krichko feels that the Ducks are where they should be after last weekend's meet with UC-Davis and OSU, and he added that Oregon should top the high score of 136.20 set last weekend.

Two gymnasts in particular who have given the Ducks a lift are freshmen Geri Frazer and Julie Tennenhouse. "With the team being this small, they can do a job for us. They can be our spark," Krichko says.

SCHLADMING, Austria (AP) — American Steve Mahre stepped out of the shadow of his twin brother Phil and won the giant slalom title at the World Alpine Skiing Championships Wednesday.

Mahre defeated favored defending champion Ingemar Stenmark of Sweden, who took the silver medal. Boris Strel of Yugoslavia was third and collected his nation's first ever world championship medal. Mahre, 24, from Yakima, Wash., never had won an international giant slalom going into Wednesday's race.

"It is a great thrill for me, because now I have won the most important giant slalom of the year," said the 24-year-old American. Mahre became the first U.S. skier to take an individual title in the world championships. Billy Kidd won the combined title at Val Gardena, Italy in 1970, while Phil Mahre took the combined title at the 1980 Lake Placid Winter Olympics.

SEATTLE (AP) — The Seattle Seahawks insist they want to keep free agent placekicker Efren Herrera.

"No, he's not unwanted," general manager John Thompson said, on Tuesday. "Of course, we want to sign him."

On Monday, Herrera became a free agent. The seven-year professional from UCLA suggested that the Seahawks wanted to unload him and his salary, and replace him with a younger

kicker with a lower salary.

The Oregon men's alpine ski team finished second out of 11 teams entered in the Anthony Lakes Alpine Slalom last Friday. Oregon State finished first in the event.

Freshman Regan Carter came up with a second place in the individual competition to lead Oregon, while sophomore Mike Pfeffer and freshman Rick Peterson finishing 12th and 17th, respectively, out of a field of 80 men.

The men have finished second in each of the last three meets and have nearly clinched a spot in regionals. The College of Idaho leads the league.

Brent Woyat, a freshman out of Canada who is the leading skier for Oregon, was not able to attend Friday's slalom.

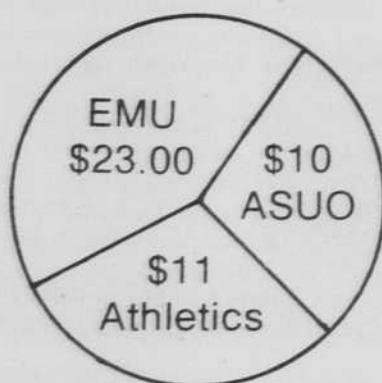
