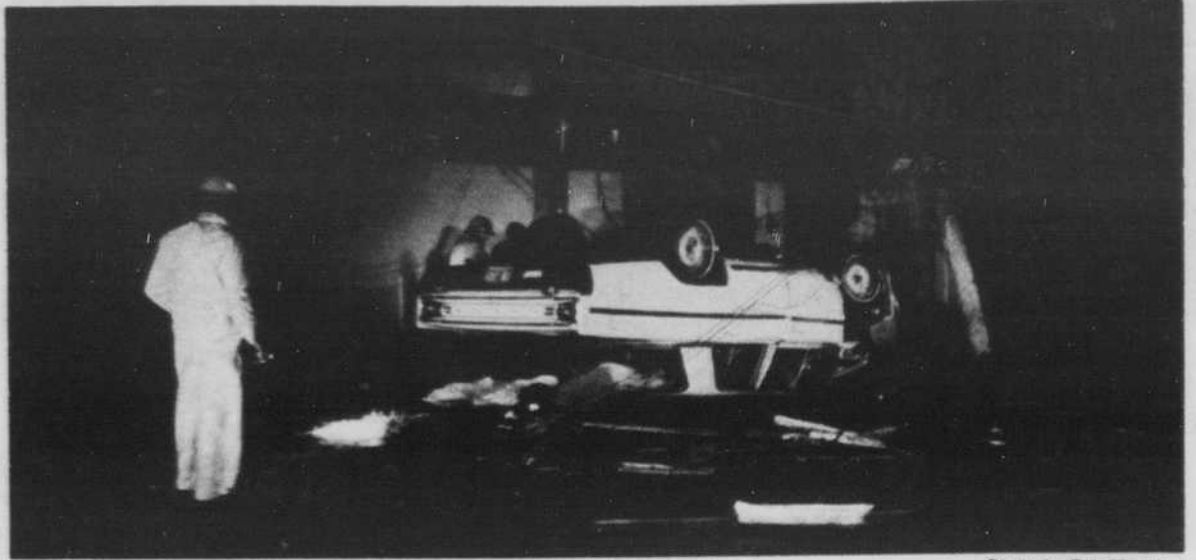

## University student killed

A University student was killed and his companion injured after the car they were traveling in went out of control in a deep pool of water and smashed into a power pole.

James Jones, 21, of 1750 Hilyard St., Apt. 26 was killed at about 1 a.m. Wednesday morning, as he and Bernard Bjork, 28, of 3501 Hilyard St., Apt. 24, were traveling west on Franklin Boulevard.

Bjork sustained injuries and is in stable condition at McKenzie-Willamette Hospital, Springfield. He is also believed to be a former University student.

The cause of the accident is not yet known.

Power in the Glenwood area was interrupted for several hours because of the wreck.

university president in Oregon) since 1979. He hold a master's degree in bacteriology and a Ph.D. in microbiology and biochemistry from the University of Wisconsin, and was head of the biological sciences department at Purdue University for 16 years.

Koffler, who is 59, said he was attracted to the chancellor position partially by a commitment to influence the changing direction of higher Oregon's budget problems seem to be short-

term, and cuts in the higher education budget should reflect that, Koffler said. Faculty tenure should be protected "absolutely as long as you can" because laying off tenured faculty can quickly alter the true nature of institutions, he said.

"I owe something to the young people now, to see that what we created be preserved," he said.

million, this will not further disadvantage the unemployed or under-employed."

"Super HARRP" is needed, the governor said, because tax relief is unjustifiable for those with high incomes. "Combining the programs, and providing relief only for those with incomes under \$35,000, will save the state general fund \$35 million in this biennium."

"Super HARRP," however, was rejected earlier in the special session because many legislators thought the proposal too complex to deal with in a special session.

Saying that "we have to wade our way

through the best of the bad answers," Atiyeh recommended an increase in beer and wine taxes for one year (\$4.4 million in revenue), an increase in taxpayer audits to collect disputed tax dollars (\$8 million), and an increase in income tax collections (\$5.5 million).

Atiyeh responded — in an interview after the press conference — to criticism that he is inconsistent by advocating cuts in higher education budgets while recommending \$500,000 for a special high-technology education program: "It's just a matter of targeting money for what I think is important right now."
