Gather 'round

Jerry Rust, Lane County Commissioner running for governor, climbed atop the EMU soapbox Wednesday and let students know where he stands.

"You've gotta get involved — let 'em know how you feel," Rust advised, directing students to send postcards to their congress-

men.

Weyerhaeuser's McKenzie River project "went against the land-use plan of the people" and was "on their terms — not the community's terms," Rust said to smattering applause. Rust's visit was sponsored by the University Democrats.

Groups slate forum on aid cuts

A forum to discuss Pres. Ronald Reagan's proposed financial aid cuts will be held tonight at 7:30 in EMU Room 167.

The forum, sponsored by the ASUO and SUAB, brings together both critics and supporters of Reagan's budget proposal. Reagan's proposal includes a \$141.5 million reduction in 1982-83 financial aid appropriation.

Reagan's 1983-84 proposal

would eliminate \$590 million from the amount available this academic year.

Defending Reagan's proposal will be Peter Murphy, Reagan's campaign head in Oregon during the 1980 election. Other scheduled speakers include Cynthia Wooten, city council member and an aide to Rep. Jim Weaver, D-Oregon; Ray Naff, an aide to Sen. Mark Hatfield, R-Oregon; and Eduardo Wolle, the

Oregon Student Lobby's legislative assistant.

Kathryn Eaton, head of the Bureau of Government Research Library, is moderator for the event.

Speakers will have five minutes to present their views. After allowing the panel 15 minutes to question each other, the forum will be opened up to questions from the audience.

Meanwhile, the ASUO-SUAB letter-writing campaign produced 640 letters by Tuesday night, toward an 800 letter goal. The tables providing materials probably will end tonight, but will begin again next term if more volunteers can be found, according to Dave Berns, the ASUO's legislative coordinator.

Berns says the ASUO received a call from Weaver's office in Washington, D.C. Tuesday that thanked them for letters received so far and asked that students keep them coming.

The staff commented that the letters are good ammunition for the congressional battle over the aid cuts that started this week, Berns says.

Belushi died of cocaine, heroin OD, coroner says

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Comedy star John Belushi died of an overdose of cocaine and heroin, the Los Angeles coroner announced Wednesday.

Coroner Thomas Noguchi said that Belushi died "due to intravenous injections of heroin and cocaine," and said that both drugs were found on the premises where he died.

Noguchi's secretary said that the coroner would comment on the results Thursday but would have no immediate comment.

The written announcement said that the medical investigation into Belushi's death has been completed.

The brief statement said, "The deceased died of an overdose due to intravenous injections of heroin and cocaine. Both the cocaine and heroin were found on the premises."

The 33-year-old comedy star was found dead in a rented bungalow last Friday.
