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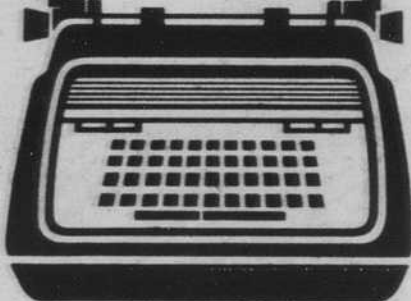

But the Ducks battled back. Alison Lang hit a turnaround jumper, Chris Metzger hit another jumper and before you could say comeback it was 40-38.

But instead of folding, Missouri hung tough. The two teams traded baskets until the Ducks finally took the lead on two Smith free throws with 5:37 left to make it 48-46. But the Tigers countered with two quick buckets and quickly regained the lead.

"That was a key stretch," said Heiny. "They had begun to pull away and were looking good. I was kind of worried but the girls battled back."

Oregon tied it at 50 on two Alison Lang free throws. But after that it was lights out.

Walker hit two jumpers in a five-second span to give the Tigers a 54-50 lead with 2:05 left and when Annette Hollins hit a free throw with 2:02 left the Ducks trailed by five.

But the Ducks refused to lie dead. Lang hit a free throw to make it 55-51, but Melissa McFerrin countered with a charity shot of her own to make it 56-53. Diana Trask cut the lead to three on a long jumper from the corner. But fouls and turnovers cost the Ducks a final run at the Tigers.

"We sure had our chances," said Heiny. "This is one of our worst games of the season."

The stats clearly show that.

The Ducks, after a dismal first half shooting performance, hit on 15-of-42 for the game for 35 percent. But the key stat was the turnover department, where the Ducks turned the ball over 31

times. But Missouri shot poorly also. The Tigers managed to connect on only 21-of-69 from the floor. But they stole the ball 14 times from the Ducks. A stat which indicates that their press was effective.

"I thought our press hurt them," said Lorraine Ferret, who finished with eight points. "They wanted to lob the ball inside, and we didn't let them. But we put them on the free throw line too many times."

"I didn't think the crowd was all that much of a factor. They did affect us a couple times but I think we handled it. This is the biggest crowd we have played against all season."

Excellent free throw shooting kept the Ducks in the game. Oregon connected on an amazing 23-of-26 from the line. They were a perfect 12-of-12 in the first half from the line. Lang led the Ducks from the line connecting on 12-of-12.

But it's still a disappointing way to end the season for the ninth-ranked Ducks. Plans for second and third round action at Stanford and a crack at the final four were all shot down in one game.

"I don't think we should have been beaten," Heiny said. "We had so many chances we should have capitalized on. The bottom line was that we did not make shots. We would have three-on-one fast breaks and still not score. That's frustrating. We haven't shot that badly all year. We had high percentage shots, too."

"But they deserved it. They played well. Maybe we were looking too far ahead."

**The Oregon lacrosse club** earned its first win of the season this weekend in Salem, posting a 9-7 victory over Willamette University. The Ducks held a 6-4 halftime bulge and never looked back.

Brent Summers, Rob McGregor, Scrafford Orser and Jeff Wallace all had two goals in the Duck attack while Scott Peil had one.

**The Oregon women's gymnastics team** ended their season Friday with a fourth-place finish in regional competition at Corvallis.

Meanwhile, 2nd-ranked Oregon State upset No. 1-ranked Utah to win the meet and earn the Northwest's automatic seed in the NCAA meet March 26-27 in Salt Lake City, Utah. OSU finished with a score of 146.10 to Utah's 145.20. Washington was third with 138.85 and the Ducks fourth with a 134.95 mark.

Oregon's only top five finisher in the meet was senior Sara Gustafson, who tied for third on the vault with a 9.0. Before the meet, coach Gary Vanderhoef had hoped for big performances from Maureen Nolan on the bars (Nolan had a season high of 9.3 on the bars in the Washington Invitational) and Jeannette Stewart in the floor exercise, but neither was able to finish among the leaders.

**AMES, Iowa** — Although he did not go out in a blaze of glory, Oregon's all American wrestler Bill Nugent went down fighting in the consolation finals at the NCAA wrestling championships Saturday at Ames, Iowa.

Nugent bounced back from being eliminated from championship round competition — and his first loss of the year — to gain a 6-3 decision over Randy Conrad of Iowa State in the consolation semi-finals Saturday. But in the match for third place, the senior 142-pounder was decisively beaten by Minnesota's Jim Martinez by a count of 7-5, leaving Nugent in fourth place with a season's record of 18-2.

Nugent was the only Oregon wrestler to place in the national tournament of the nine Ducks who qualified for the nationals. As a team the Ducks fell eight places short of their goal in placing 18th overall. Oregon finished the tourney with 16.5 points.

Favored Iowa won its record fifth straight national title, piling up a record 131.75 points, 20 more than in-state rival Iowa State which finished second.

**PULLMAN, Wash. (AP)** — Danny Evans scored 18 points and Lester Conner added 16 as No. 4 Oregon State rolled past Pepperdine 70-51 Sunday to advance to the semifinals of the West Regional NCAA basketball tournament.

The Pacific-10 Conference Beavers will meet Idaho, the eighth-ranked Big Sky Conference champion, Thursday at Provo, Utah. Idaho advanced to the semifinals with a 69-67 overtime victory over Iowa in the other West Regional game Sunday.

Evans contributed eight first-half points and added 10 more in the second half. The Beavers' Charlie Sitton contributed 14.

Pepperdine was paced by Orlando Phillips' 16 points, while Dane Suttle, who fouled out late in the second half, added 10.

Pepperdine Coach Jim Harrick said he wouldn't have paid to watch his team lose.

"My dad said there would be days like this — he just didn't say when they'd come," Harrick said.

Oregon State Coach Ralph Miller praised his squad for their poise. "We controlled the tempo," he said.

"We won't shoot against their zone. They know us well enough to know if we have the ball at half court, you have to come get us."

### In other NCAA Tournament action across the nation:

**DALLAS (AP)** — John Bagley and Michael Adams combined for 47 points Sunday as Boston College shocked No. 2 DePaul 82-75, marking the third straight year the Blue Demons were defeated in their NCAA basketball tournament opener.

Boston College, now 21-9, will meet Kansas State, which nipped Arkansas 65-64, at St. Louis in the Midwest regional finals Friday night.

**INDIANAPOLIS (AP)** — Ricky Stokes hit two free throws with 15 seconds to go and Jeff Jones added one foul shot after time had expired Sunday, capping a Virginia rally and giving the third-ranked Cavaliers a 54-51 victory over Tennessee in the second round of the NCAA Midwest basketball tournament.

Virginia, which beat Tennessee in the East Regional semifinals last year, advances to next Thursday's Midwest Regional against host Alabama-Birmingham.

**INDIANAPOLIS (AP)** — Randy Breuer's layup with 55 seconds left gave No. 11 Minnesota a 62-61 victory over Tennessee-Chattanooga Sunday in a second-round game of the NCAA Midwest Regional basketball tournament.

The Big Ten champions, 23-5, now take on Louisville Thursday in regional semifinal play at Birmingham, Ala.

**UNIONDALE, N.Y. (AP)** — Freshman Ennis Whalley scored six points in the final six minutes, including a pair of tie-breaking free throws with four minutes left, and 13th-ranked Alabama struggled to a 69-68 victory Sunday over St. John's in the second round of the NCAA East Regional basketball playoffs.

The win advanced the Crimson Tide to the regional semifinals at Raleigh, N.C., against top-ranked North Carolina Friday night.
