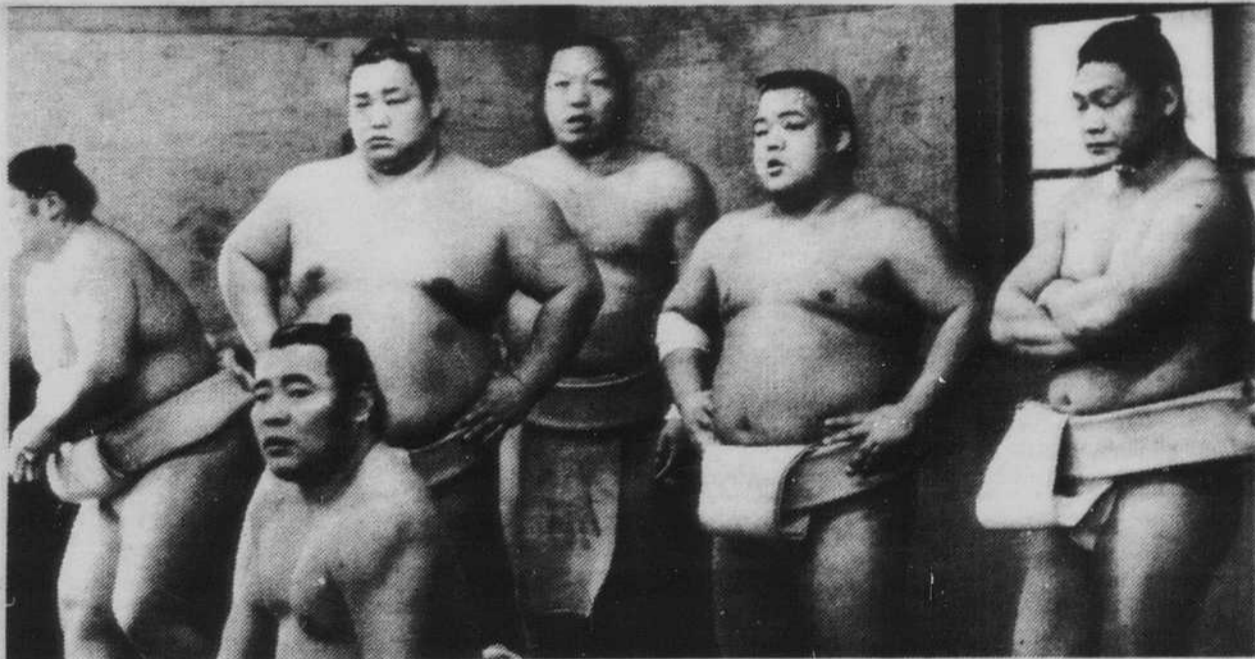

Greeks replace garbage as energy source

Fraternity and sorority representatives are hot under the collar over the most recent energy-saving proposal by the University Physical Plant. After negotiations broke down with Lane County to burn processed garbage as fuel, plant director Harold Bodyblock said they were forced to turn to "the next best thing."

"We feel utilizing the maximum efficiency resource in this incidence requires us to optimize our potentiality. After analyzing all available input, we have selected the alternative of using compacted Greeks - young men and women belonging to fraternities and sororities - to regenerate our steadily disappearing 'hog fuel.'"

Biff Izod, spokesman for Chi-Bita-Offa fraternity, said the proposal "reeked," and was "really gnarly."

"There's no way we're going to get pumped for an idea as outrageous as that," Izod said at an emotional meeting of the University planning committee Wednesday. Izod said plans are in the works for a giant function to protest the proposal.

"It'll be radical," he promised.

Planning committee members said they had spent

nearly a week trying to come up with several other fuel alternatives, including convicted football felons, Sony Walkmans, future issues of the Emerald and whale oil. But Bodyblock said GDF (Greek Derived Fuel) seemed to be the "final solution."

"We had to consider all factors," Bodyblock said. "There's less to Greeks, so they compact easier, and the smell should be more tolerable because of the amount of cologne and perfume they wear." And, he added, "they're less likely to do anything about it."

Campus planner David Rowdy, said he has already talked to representatives from the EMU Craft Center and the business school on future marketing prospects for the fuel byproducts. James "Tex" Troniks, business school dean, said he was initially worried that sudden decreased enrollments in his school might hurt its finances, but was reassured that he would have access to a steady stream of 280 Z's, Scirocos and Mazda X 19's to sell for extra revenue.

Lisa Loom, a craft center employee, read an optimistic report to the committee on the current market demand for nicely tanned or grease painted lamp shades. Detergent distributors have expressed an interest in soap bars scented with Charley or Grey

Fiannel colognes, Loom added.

The meeting grew tense when Kiki Rosehips yelled shrilly, "Geez! You don't even understand our lifestyle," and demanded to read a poem that she said she was "totally psyched about."

"Phi Delt," she read, "with the punch that kicks the jelly that sticks, the Phi Delt put on a production that was no ordinary function. Gamma Phi's danced the night away, and we want Buffet night to stay." Bodyblock reminded Rosehips that the proposal still was in the planning stages and probably wouldn't go into effect until late spring, leaving plenty of time for spring formal rush.

"I still say we're getting faced" Rosehips yelled, but committee chairer Bodyblock's proposal is expected to be signed into law by University Pres. Paul Hohum. In a letter addressed to the planning committee, Hohum stated "Although I can relate to the feelings the Greek community must now be experiencing, I think the solution is a sound one. Anything less than what has been proposed could devastate the University."

Rowdy said he urges other students to comment on the proposal either directly to him or through letters to the editor.
