Gasoline prices creeping upward

NEW YORK

After a year-long slide, gasoline prices are creeping upward in many parts of the nation. Some industry officials believe consumers will see substantially higher prices this summer as the oil glut disappears.

Several major oil companies posted increases this week in the price they charge wholesale distributors, and analysts say the added cost will show up at the retail pump before the start of the summer driving season.

Shell Oil Co., for example, increased its wholesale prices by as much as 3 cents a gallon in some Western states. Last week it added a penny a gallon to prices

in much of the Northeast and Southeast.

The national average price for all grades at all types of outlets was \$1.18 a gallon in mid-April, down a penny from the first week of the month, according to Lundberg Survey Inc., which tracks pump prices. The average peaked at \$1.38 a gallon.

Although demand for gasoline remains generally weak, the oil companies are raising prices to distributors in reaction to a recent firming of crude oil prices. That turnaround for crude oil is linked mainly to the success of the Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries in limiting its production.
