British threaten renewed fighting

FALKLAND ISLANDS

Britain warned Thursday there may be more fighting around the Falkland Islands despite U.N. peace efforts, and Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher said she would never betray the pro-British Falk-

landers in a compromise with Argentina.

No new fighting was reported in the South Atlantic, but the British Defense Ministry said its forces shot down two Argentine Skyhawk fighters, a third fighter crashed and a British ship was slightly damaged in a Wednesday battle about 30 miles west of the islands. The ministry also said a British helicopter ditched in the sea but its four-man crew

was saved.

In Buenos Aires, Argentina's military government said it would meet any new threat with force but that it was still possible to settle the six-week dispute with honor.

"Military incidents may occur with increasing frequency as the net closes 'round the islands,'" British Foreign Secretary Francis Pym told the House of Commons in its fifth emergency debate on the crisis.

New street violence reported in Poland

WARSAW, Poland

New street violence broke out in Warsaw and Krakow Thursday evening after a day of scattered protests marking five months of martial law.

Witnesses said the worst clashes were in Krakow, where police firing tear gas, water cannon and concussion grenades battled a crowd estimated at 10,000 gathered outside a church.

The witnesses said the crowd gathered outside the Church of the Virgin Mary in Krakow after a Mass and began chanting "Solidarity! Solidarity!" and yelling for a march. Police charged the crowd with shields and nightsticks and the battle began.

A smaller clash involving about 1,000 youths took place in Warsaw's Old City, and police dispersed the crowd with tear gas and clubs. The incidents were smaller and less violent than the rioting of May 3, which lasted for hours.

Prior to the evening violence, Thursday's demonstrations were not as widespread or as serious as the underground leadership of the suspended Solidarity trade union had called for.
