

of the teams involved for the team race are altitude based, everyone will be in the same boat," Heinonen said.

"I've doped us out at scoring about 100 points, but where that will put us is anybody's guess."

Leann Warren clearly hasn't been showing the form that en-

abled her to win the 800 and 1,500 meters last year. Whether or not she is fit enough to run in both events, Heinonen will decide today.

"Leann will have to dig deep if she is going to repeat as champion, but she is pretty good at doing that," Heinonen said.

Kathy Hayes, the phenomenal freshman who has the best time in the country in both the 3,000 and 5,000, will probably run only one of those races. Heinonen says she is a "good bet" to score well no matter where she runs. "Experience is the goal," he said. "Simply getting there

(to nationals) will be good for her and the other freshman."

Eryn Forbes, whom Heinonen calls his most experienced distance runner will run in both the 5,000 and 10,000, with a good shot at winning her first title. But awesome Kelly Cathy of Oklahoma stands in her way in the longer distance. Cathy broke the American record in the 10,000 by more than 30 seconds, but the record wasn't legal because men were in the race.

Oregon should score well in the javelin with returning champion Sally Harmon out to defend her title. Harmon's biggest competition should come from her own teammates, Lynda Hughes and Roz Rouse. Hughes should be especially tough after outthrowing Harmon all season.

Oregon should also pick up points in the hurdles with Lexie Miller and Chris Costello.

Miller has been fighting nagging injuries all year, but Heinonen calls her a "big meet competitor who'll be in the thick of things." Costello, a senior has been "sprinting better than

ever and should be ready in her last go-around."

Grace Bakari should have a good opportunity to score in the 200 and 400 if she can overcome a bad knee and the flu.

Heinonen also expects points out of Rosa Gutierrez in the 3,000; Claudette Groenendaal in the 1,500; Ranza Clark in the 800; and Quenna Beasley and Karen McDonald in the discus.

The distances, however, will be the key to Oregon's finish, as it has been in the past.

"A lot of people want to take a look at the new Oregon distance runners. I'm proud of them, I only wish the meet wasn't at high altitude, and everyone could use tactics instead of having to run all out," Heinonen said.

"It should be a heck of a meet anyway."

## Umpqua nine eliminated from national tourney

**GRAND JUNCTION, Colo. (AP)**—Mike Devereux stroked a two-run homer and later scored on a wild pitch to lead Mesa Community College of Arizona to an 8-4 victory over Umpqua Community College of Roseberg, Ore., in the the national junior college baseball tournament Monday.

Mesa pulled to a 5-0 lead in the third inning on Devereux's homer, on Paul Williams' run-scoring triple and Craig Kuhse's run on an infield sacrifice. Guy Massey scored from third on a walk for the final run of the inning.

Mesa's three other runs came in the eighth inning, with the score 5-4, when Devereux scored on Umpqua pitcher Rich Carter's wild throw and scored on a two-run double by Ron Devereux, Mike Devereux's brother.

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
