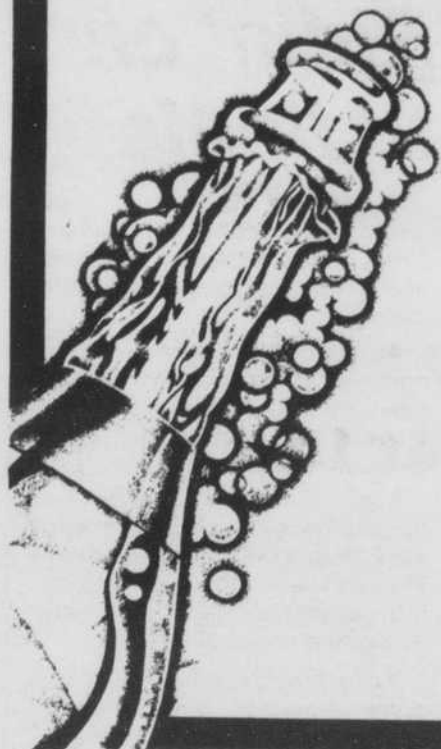

## Voters approve levy for law enforcement

Lane County voters approved higher property taxes to support law enforcement Tuesday but turned down similar fund requests for school districts.

The one-year levy, raising \$3 million to restore some of the money cut from the District Attorney's office and the Sheriff's Department, passed by a comfortable margin, with 20,316 voting in favor of the tax and 18,429 voting against.

About 25 percent of the country's eligible voters cast ballots, 10 points higher than expected.

Meanwhile, voters turned down special tax requests from three school districts and approved a tax levy to support the rural fire department in Zumbach.

Passage of the law enforcement levy marks the first time

voters have approved a tax increase since they turned down a \$10 million increase in the tax base to improve the county's revenue last year. Budget cuts resulting from the levy failure reduced District Attorney Pat Horton's office to 35 employees from a high of 75 two years ago.

"It looks like we'll be able to hire a few more attorneys" and prosecute more cases, said a satisfied Horton Tuesday night as the first returns were announced.

Sheriff Dave Burks said he may be able to rehire as many as 40 deputies who were laid off following the earlier levy defeat.

By voting to fund law enforcement Lane County voters showed "they trust their own judgement better than they trust their elected official's," Horton said.

## ASUO leaders to learn 1983 legislative issues

Student government leaders and Oregon Student Lobby board members will meet September 24 to discuss higher education issues facing the 1983 Legislature.

ASUO leaders will learn the nuts and bolts of legislative and OSL workings, says Debi Lance, ASUO director of University affairs. Workshops on lobbying

and conducting a voter registration drive will also be held, she says.

Speakers include state Rep. Margie Hendriksen, Vice Chancellor Bill Lemman and state Sen. Ed Fadeley.

The conference will be held in conjunction with an OSL board meeting September 25.
