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Braves lose game, but win pennant

Atlanta clinched the National League West championship Sunday, capping a roller-coaster season that finally saw the Braves with their first division title since 1969 despite losing 5-1 to San Diego.

The Braves, who built their season on streaks — both winning and losing — finally won the division when the San Francisco Giants defeated the Los Angeles Dodgers 5-3 on the same afternoon.

Atlanta came into the contest leading Los Angeles by one game in the division and with what Manager Joe Torre called a chance to finally "quit playing scoreboard."

In the end, however, the Braves couldn't avoid that tension-filled game. As the Padres held fan appreciation drawings after the final game of the regular season while the Braves waited eagerly for that other score 500 miles north of here.

Torre closed the locker room until the Dodgers' game was over.

The Braves were forced to back into the title, and avoid a one-game playoff with the Dodgers, when San Diego came up with five runs in the fifth, three of them on bases loaded triple by Allan Wiggins.

The Braves took a one-run lead on Terry Harper's lead-off homer in the top of the fifth off San Diego left-hander Tim Lollar, who was credited with his 16th win in 25 decisions.

The Padres, however, struck back quickly, scoring five runs in the bottom of the inning with the help of some close plays and the shinbone of second base umpire Bob Engel.

Rookie Tony Gwynn led off the San Diego fifth with a single to left, but it came only after he received a second life when Atlanta left fielder Terry Harper dropped his foul fly near the stands. Broderick Perkins, the

Padres' first baseman, then lined a one-hopper toward second baseman Glenn Hubbard.

It looked like the perfect double play ball until it hit Engel in the leg, allowing Perkins to reach first with a single as Gwynn reached second.

A single barely out of the reach and over the head of shortstop Rafael Ramirez by Tim Flannery loaded the bases, and San Diego's first run scored when starter Rick Camp, 11-13, walked the opposition pitcher, Lollar, on a 3-2 pitch.

That brought Wiggins to the plate, and the embattled center fielder, arrested and suspended earlier this year for drug use, slapped Camp's 1-1 delivery down the left field line as Harper charged the ball. The ball took one hop under Harper's glove and skidded to the wall as Wiggins ran to third with a three-run triple.

The Giants gained revenge for being eliminated Saturday by beating the Dodgers as Joe Morgan lined a two-out, three-run homer in the seventh inning to boost them to a victory.

With a victory the Dodgers could have forced a one-game playoff with Atlanta with a vic-

tory.

The Dodgers were wrecked not only by Sunday's loss, but by a late-season eight-game losing streak. They finished one ahead of the third-place Giants.

Morgan's homer came on a 1-2 pitch from reliever Terry Forster, who had replaced Tom Niedenfuer, 3-4, with one out and runners at second and third. Forster struck out pinch-hitter Jim Wolford before facing Morgan, who broke a 2-2 tie with his 14th homer of the season.

Forster threw his glove into the air in disgust as the ball cleared the fence and Morgan slammed a fist in joy as he rounded second, while a Candlestick Park crowd of 47,457 cheered.

Fernando Valenzuela pitched the first six innings for the Dodgers, allowing only two hits and striking out nine, but he was removed in the top of the seventh for a pinch hitter.

Valenzuela retired the last 10 batters he faced.

Giants' relief ace Greg Minton, 10-4, pitched out of a bases-loaded, one-out jam in the seventh by striking out Bill Russell and retiring pinch hitter Jorge Orta on a grounder to Morgan at second.

Brewers clinch American East

BALTIMORE (AP) — Robin Yount smashed a pair of home runs and a triple as the Milwaukee Brewers beat the Baltimore Orioles 10-2 Sunday on the final day of the season to capture their first American League East Division championship.

Cecil Cooper and Ted Simmons also homered for the Brewers, who spoiled Baltimore's storybook weekend comeback on Earl Weaver's final day as manager of the Orioles.

Baltimore had won three in a row to tie the race, but the Brewers won the one game they needed to advance to the AL championship series against

the California Angels starting Tuesday in Anaheim.

The Brewers, who led the major leagues with 216 home runs, played longball against Jim Palmer, ace of the Oriole staff. And Palmer helped them build a run without a hit when he made a throwing error on an attempted pickoff.

Yount, who came into the game among the league leaders in eight offensive categories, got the Brewers started in the first inning when he tagged a 3-2 pitch into the right field seats for an opposite-field home run. It was his 28th of the season.

Walton begins comeback

SAN DIEGO (AP) — Bill Walton, trying to come back from a foot injury that forced his abrupt retirement from the National Basketball Association, took part in his first official practice this weekend since being sidelined two years ago.

The 6-foot-11½ former Portland Trail Blazers star played 21 minutes Saturday night during a scrimmage at the San Diego Clippers training camp, which is being held at the North Island Naval Air Station.

"He was all business," teammate Michael Brooks said of Walton, who scored on a variety of hooks, bank shots and slam dunks. "This was a very big night for him."

Said San Diego coach Paul Silas after watching Walton's performance: "It's the same old Bill. When he's on the court, he

brings out the best in the other players. Everyone seems to play with greater intensity."

Walton, who played seven minutes in each of the three periods of the practice game, said afterward that his oft-injured left foot felt fine.

"The only pain I have right now is a dry throat," Walton quipped. "I had a real good time. It doesn't hurt, and that's the first step. One thing that will get better is my confidence level. I want to become confident enough to make a real hard drive or a quick stop and feel that the foot will hold up."

Walton, 29, will only practice and play once a week until his foot can stand the rigors of a full NBA season. He said he doesn't want to rush his comeback because if he broke his foot again, it could shatter his hopes of returning to the NBA.

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
