## Center gets annual grant

A \$60,000 operational grant has been awarded to the University's Russian and East European Studies Center by the U.S. Department of Education.

The center uses the grant, which it has received annually since 1975, for a variety of programs, public lectures and symposia dealing with Soviet and East European culture, according to Howard Robertson, center director and a library professor.

Robertson says this year's grant will pay for library acquisitions and an annual spring symposium. The center also plans to bring Ernst Neizvestny, a Soviet sculptor who emigrated in 1976, to the University spring term to give a series of lectures.

The center is an interdisciplinary program involving faculty from nine departments in the arts and sciences college.

## Event stars commentator

Keith Jackson, ABC Sports' football and baseball commentator, will headline the 1982 High School Press Conference today at 2:30 p.m. in the EMU Ballroom.

Some 1,400 student journalists from more than 100 Oregon middle, junior and senior high schools are expected to attend the full day of activities which include lectures, tours, a writing contest and almost 60 workshops.

Also featured will be Homer Hall, a nationally recognized publications adviser from Kirkwood, Mo. He will offer guidelines for improving layout, copy, coverage and overall special effects of yearbooks.

Among the 60 workshops will be sessions on all aspects of yearbook, newspaper and photography production.

Anderson will discuss issues and problems facing the LEF. Since forming a year ago, the LEF has worked together to inventory attitudes and perceptions toward economic development in Lane County. An economic audit of the area

has allowed the foundation to identify specific economic development opportunities and have become the basis of a proposed economic development marketing plan.

Most recently, Anderson was managing director of Washington state's International Trade and Investment Division.

Anderson's talk is part of the series with the theme of business growth and economic development scheduled during fall and winter terms at the Graduate School of Management.
