

## Ducks split matches

Once again, the Oregon women's volleyball team took a ride on the roller coaster this weekend, losing to Santa Clara 15-6, 6-15, 4-15, 10-15, on Friday, then coming back to beat the University of San Francisco on Saturday, 15-9, 14-16, 15-6, 15-12.

"It's a contrast," said coach Chris Voelz, "that these girls can play so well — scrapping, getting every ball, making every play, and then have a mental lapse."

Stephanie Tambe illustrated the Ducks' up and down tendencies perfectly against Santa Clara. "Stephanie must have had at least five kills in the first game (the only game Oregon won against the Broncos), but she didn't do much after that," said Voelz.

The Ducks were also inconsistent in their serving, piling up 20 service aces in two matches, but making 20 service errors. However, Voelz was not displeased with their effort this weekend. "I thought the girls

played pretty well considering that we only had seven players to work with."

Voelz was particularly pleased with Liz Eakin, normally a reserve, who started because of Oregon's tide of injuries. "Liz was a real pleasant surprise," said Voelz. "I didn't know how she would do, but she played right hitter and center back for us, and did very well." Eakin had an excellent hitting percentage of .311 against USF.

Again, Sue Harbour was nothing short of amazing in the weekend matches. She had 15 kills, four service aces and a hitting mark of .466 against Santa Clara. She added 11 kills to go along with a .625 percentage against USF. "Harbour had an outstanding game," said Voelz in an understatement.

With the split last weekend, the Ducks are now 2-4 in Nor-Pac conference play and 9-8 on the season. Next up for Oregon are 13th-ranked California and 14th-ranked San Jose State at home this weekend.

## Back-up quarterback leads AFC 'all-stars'

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Ed Luther of San Diego fired a 54-yard touchdown pass to Seattle's Theotis Brown with 12:29 remaining Monday night, giving the American Conference squad a 31-27 victory over the National Conference team in the second National Football League Players Association-sponsored all-star game.

The contest at the Los Angeles Coliseum — the home of the Los Angeles Raiders — was played before an announced crowd of 5,331 and was televised nationally by the Turner Broadcasting System.

The seating capacity for

Raiders' home games is 70,000.

Some 15 minutes before the kickoff, Coliseum General Manager Bob Hardy said upon entering the press box, "Gee, there's more people up here than there are in the stands."

Luther, who backs up Dan Fouts with the Chargers, completed 10 of 18 passes for 180 yards and two touchdowns.

The game was billed as an AFC West against an NFC West affair, but players from all six NFL divisions took part.

The first of a series of NFLPA all-star contests was played Sunday at RFK Stadium in Washington, D.C.

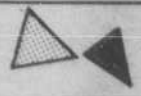

## Offensive line led to Patera's pink slip

SEATTLE (AP) — Bob Newton, who played for Jack Patera with the Seattle Seahawks for six seasons, thinks he knows what caused Patera's downfall as the Seahawks' head coach.

It wasn't the controversial release of Seahawks' player representative Sam McCullum and the storm of protest that followed, Newton contends.

That storm of protest included the informational picketing of Nordstrom's downtown Seattle department store by protesters who felt McCullum was waived by Patera because of his union activities. The Nordstrom family owns 51 percent of the Seahawks.

It also wasn't Patera's inability to get along with sportswriters, adds the former Seahawks' offensive lineman.

"Pro football owners," declares Newton, "will put up with an awful lot if you're winning."

So what caused Patera's demise?

"If you want to single out one thing," Newton assesses, "you have to look at the turnover in the offensive line. If you're going to start a pro football franchise, you start first with your offensive line."

"We had a tremendous offensive line in 1978 and 1979 when we went 9-7 both years. Then they started to tamper with it. For what reason, I don't know. But our offensive line wasn't the same after that and neither was our team."

Newton, 33, a guard, played 11 seasons in the National Football League. In 1980, he was selected as the Seahawks' Lineman of the Year by Norm Evans, who publishes the "Seahawk Report" and is a former Seahawks' offensive lineman himself.

When the Seahawks went 9-7 in their third season, Patera was acclaimed as something of a genius. Never before had an expansion team compiled such an impressive record in its third year.

Patera was picked as the National Football League Coach of the Year by the Associated Press following that 1978 season.

The Seahawks' offensive line in 1978 was made up of Nick Bebout, Tom Lynch, John Yarano, Steve August and Newton.

Bebout departed before the 1980 season in a trade with Minnesota.
