Harriers zip to easy titles

Although Oregon didn't crown any individual champions in cross country this weekend, both the men and the women easily took team titles in two separate meets.

The men, placing five runners in the top 11, won their seventh straight Northern Division championship Friday with a 10-point victory over host-team Washington State in Pullman.

The women, also placing five in the top 11, had an even easier time with a six-team Washington Invitational field at North Sea-Tac Park in Seattle. The Ducks' 23 points were well ahead of runner-up Washington's 55.

Washington's premier runner Peter Koech took the 10,000-meter title with a 29:47 clocking over Washington State's hilly golf course. Oregon junior Jim Hill was second with a 30:04 time as the Ducks and Cougars swept the top seven places.

Greg Erwin and Vance Blow finished third and fifth, respectively for the Ducks.

Kathy Hayes, Oregon's number-one runner, made the trip, but didn't run because of a sprained ligament in her left foot she suffered during the week. This throws a wrench into coach Tom Heinonen's plans of a District 8 Championship and a trip to nationals.

"The middle of last week is when she sprained the ligament," Heinonen said. "She can't run a step right now and her competing at district depends on how the injury develops."

Bowie going bye-bye?

CHICAGO (AP) — Bowie Kuhn's effort to keep his job as baseball commissioner is expected to reach a conclusion Monday at a meeting of all 26 major league owners.

Kuhn and his supporters have been lobbying frantically since meetings at San Diego last August when the question of the commissionership was tabled in a last-minute effort to prevent the National League from voting Kuhn out.

The American League and the NL will hold separate meetings Monday before convening in a joint session. Kuhn must win the approval of both leagues to retain his position.

Washington's Regina Joyce, whom Hayes defeated two weeks ago, took the individual 5,000 meter crown in 17:01 — 14 seconds quicker than runner-up Margaret Groos, running unattached.

Oregon was led by sophomore Rosa Gutierrez, who finished third with a time of 17:19. Eryn Forbes was fourth for the Ducks while freshman Kim Roth was sixth.

The real surprise for the Ducks came when Lisa Martin and Claudette Groenendaal, taking up the slack caused by Hayes' absence, finished seventh and 11th, respectively.

"We had a come-through performance from the two we needed it most from — Lisa and Claudette. Our fourth and fifth runners are our most important when we get into a meet of this kind," Heinonen said of the duo.

"Lisa put in her first complete performance of the season that she has felt satisfied with. Claudette has had marked improvement over her last two races. She is feeling comfortable with the 5,000-meter distance."

Heinonen also lauded Gutierrez, who gave the non-collegiate Groos a tough race. She finished four seconds behind Groos.

"Rosa bounced back from a sub-par race at Creswell (the Oregon Track Club Invitational, Oct. 17) and was aggressive the whole course," he said. "There were some strong runners. Some were post-collegians who are tough and aggressive and they don't give anything up. Rosa ran into one with Groos, who is darn near world class. It

is valuable for us to run against them."

With the District 8 Championships Nov. 13 in Fresno, Calif., Heinonen is taking a close look at his team and how they will stack up with the competition.

He pointed out the Ducks' time split between the one and five runners of only 41 seconds Saturday as significant.

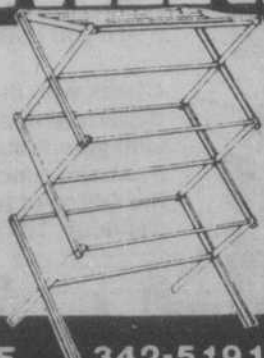
