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## Racial conference starts today

The fifth annual conference of the Willamette Valley Racial Minorities Consortium, which begins today in Salem at Chemeketa Community College, will focus on "The Emerging Minorities in Oregon."

Featured speakers are Alfredo de los Santos, the vice chancellor of Maricopa County (Arizona) Community College District, Matthew Prophet, superintendent of Portland Public Schools and Beatrice Medicine, from the anthropology department, University of California at Northridge.

The conference begins this morning with several workshops and panels on business, politics, education and community service. Prophet will speak at 8 p.m. and a dance, sponsored by the Mujeres de Oregon, will follow.

Saturday's events have been dedicated to a student emphasis. A minority business information center and an ethnic food fair will be featured throughout the conference.

The conference is being held in conjunction with the Regional Conference of the Pacific Northwest Black Studies Council.

"Everyone is welcome to attend any or all of the sessions," says Bean McFadden, director of the University's affirmative action office.

Registration is \$15 for two days, \$10 for one day and \$5 for students. More information may be obtained at Room 472 Oregon Hall or by phoning extension 3123.

## Safecracker hits music school

About \$1,100 in cash and checks was stolen over the weekend from the safe in the University music school, according to Anita Vaughn, accounting clerk in the music school.

Vaughn cautions those who wrote checks for single tickets to stop payment on their

checks. She is not sure exactly how many checks were involved, but she has notified those she knows wrote checks. Much of the money stolen was from a pair of concerts held Oct. 7 and Oct. 28.

Vaughn says the safe was apparently pried open over the

weekend. The money was being held in the music school for auditing before deposit. She says the \$1,100 was a small percentage of the money brought in from the concerts, because most of the purchases are in season tickets.

The music school is now in the process of discussing a new policy of depositing money in a bank before it is audited, says Vaughn.

"Security is being changed," she says.

Vaughn says where the safe was located in the music school "may have been common knowledge."
