One "uneasy conscience" has decided crime doesn't pay after all.

Guilt pangs have apparently plagued a former student for years, and so the thief decided to make amends by returning the stolen article pictured above — a centennial flag from the University's 1976 celebration.

Enclosed with the banner was a short note:

"Dear people:

During my stay at the U of O, I acquired the enclosed Centennial banner. Please accept my apologies for its late return."

Signed — "An Uneasy Conscience."

Jan Medrano, management assistant, said the banner and the letter, which arrived with the mail at the president's office on Friday, will be taken to the University archives.

The return address reads "A. U. C. 3.78 GPA St. Anytown, USA, 97200." The package had a Portland postmark.

No moves have been made to analyze the fingerprints on the letter or the banner.

ASUO creates gazette to assist communication

The ASUO will receive additional input into its decision-making process if a newsletter now being mailed to other student governments proves successful.

The first edition of the ASUO Interinstitutional Chronicle is being sent to universities throughout the country to inform other student governments about ASUO activities and policies and to prompt correspondence.

The ASUO started the newsletter in response to inquiries about ASUO activities from the student governments of institutions such as Arizona State University and the University of Vermont, says Mark Cleveland, ASUO director of University and academic affairs and Chronicle co-editor.

Other student governments

are asking about the ASUO's hierarchy, pay structure and other characteristics, he says.

"This is an encouraging sign of some of the prestige that this school has gained," Cleveland says.

Articles in the first monthly newsletter explain the ASUO, the University and the newsletter's purpose. About 100 copies were mailed to other universities, University officials and key legislators, says Dane Clausen, ASUO press officer and Chronicle co-editor.

"The ASUO would like to establish a bigger place on the academic map for the University," Clausen says.

The newsletter may increase the sharing of ideas between student governments, Clausen says.

Men armed with sticks rob University student

Four men robbed a 20-year-old University student on an early-morning walk through Pioneer Cemetery over the weekend, according to Eugene city police.

The victim, who told police he was taking a shortcut through the graveyard at about 2 a.m. Saturday, was confronted by four men armed with sticks. After demanding the student's wallet, the four took \$40 and left on foot, said police.

One suspect was described as a white male, age 20 to 28, 170 pounds, 5 feet 8 inches to 5 feet 10 inches tall with straight blond collar-length hair and a mustache. He was wearing a dark-plaid flannel shirt and blue jeans.

Another suspect in the robbery is a Mexican male, age 24, 180 pounds, 5 feet 6 inches, with straight black hair and a short beard. He was last seen wearing a dark shirt, blue jeans and a stocking cap.

A third suspect is a white male, age 20 to 25, 160 pounds, 5 feet 8 inches tall, with short blond hair. He wore a green army jacket, blue jeans and tennis shoes.

The last suspect was described as a white male, 20 years old, 160 pounds, 5 feet 8 inches tall, with brown collar-length hair. He was wearing blue jeans and a dark shirt.

Eugene police are investigating the incident, according to Lt. Guy Mattoon.
