

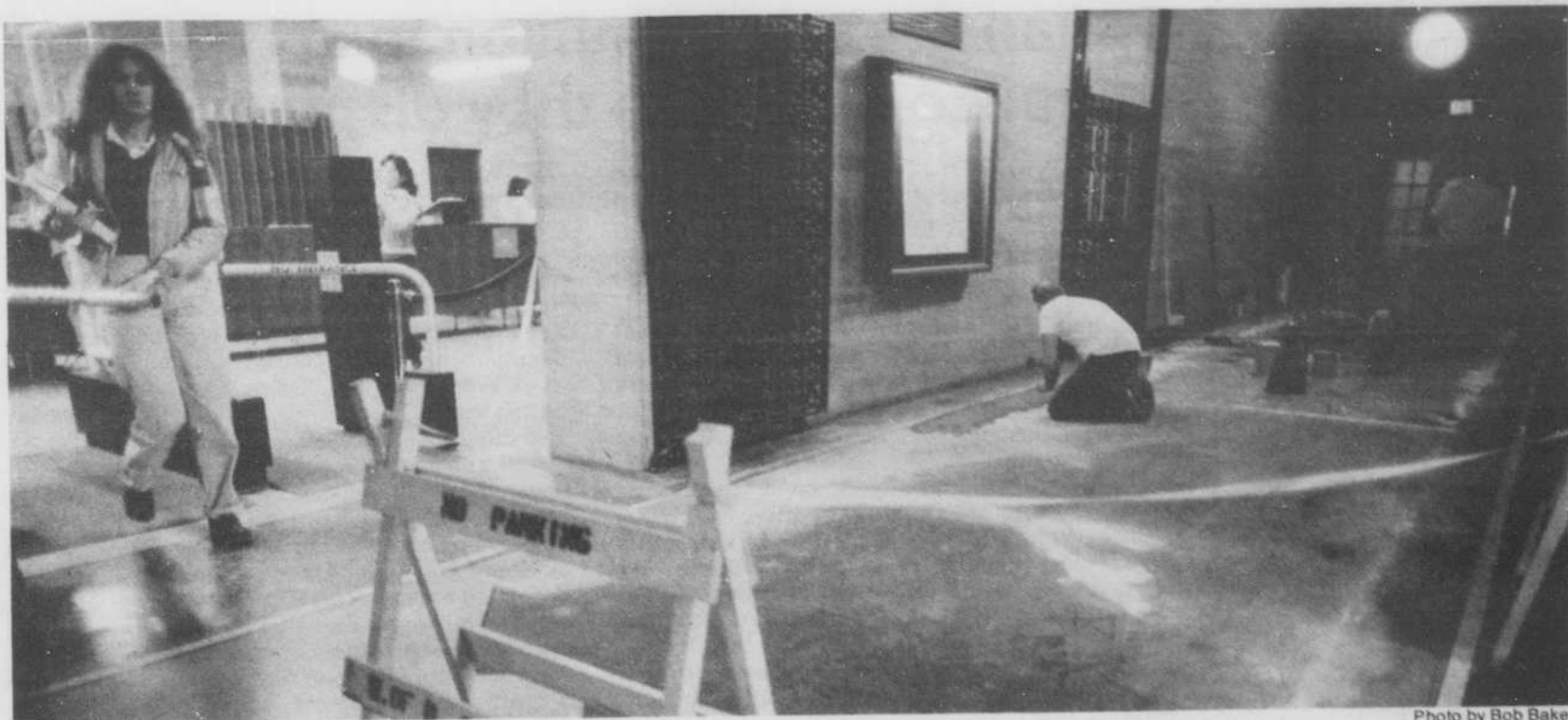

Refloorestation

The University physical plant began work on the floor of the west library entrance Jan. 11, forcing the closure of part of the entrance corridor.

Workers on the project hoped to finish the entire entrance by the end of the week.

George Bynon, director of admin-

istrative services at the library, says the workers will probably finish the west end late today or early Thursday, and will spend the rest of the week retiling the east end.

Dave Rowe, University planner, indicated the entrance to the library was a "space of special significance," and

that the University would try to keep as close to the original decor and style as possible. The new tile is the same color as the tile it replaces.

The physical plant had hoped to be able to finish the tiling over the Christmas break, but a problem in obtaining the tiles delayed the project.

Professor to speak about life in Poland

University political science professor Joseph Fiszman will discuss life in Poland at the Eugene Conference Center, 7th and Oak, Thursday at 8 p.m.

The presentation opens the winter Forum Lecture Series, sponsored by the University Committee for the Arts and Humanities.

Fiszman, who visited Poland twice in 1982 to study the relationship between the Polish Catholic Church and Polish Communist Party, will give personal impressions of changes in Polish citizens' lives in his talk titled "Poland: Country in

Disarray."

"Every aspect of the country, whether cultural, economic or moral, has been affected," Fiszman says. "The people of Poland are watching their country disintegrate."

Fiszman was born in Poland but became an American citizen after World War II. He has written numerous works on contemporary Poland and comparative politics.

Balfe unveils proposal to ODE board

ASUO Pres. C.J. Balfe unveiled a proposal to settle a controversy over the length of the terms of two ASUO representatives on the Oregon Daily Emerald board of directors at an ODE board of directors meeting Monday.

Balfe proposed the ASUO representatives' terms be returned to one-year periods with an orientation period for newly appointed representatives before becoming voting board members. The ASUO Constitution forbids ASUO

presidents from making appointments for time periods longer than their one-year terms of office, Balfe said.

Such an arrangement would allow the appointees to become familiar with the Emerald before taking their posts, ensuring student continuity on the board, he added.

The ODE board approved a bylaws change last March extending the terms of appointed ASUO representatives from one year to two years and creating an elected student-at-

large position for a one-year term. The board extended the terms to preserve student continuity on the board, instead of having the annual re-orientation of new representatives, says Emerald editor Harry Esteve.

Balfe additionally requested the board return the representatives' terms to the one-year periods previous to the bylaws change until the situation is clarified and solved. Balfe said he would like the problem settled before he leaves office in May.

The board will inform ASUO of its decision in one or two days, after consulting with its attorney, said board chairer Jim Edmundson.

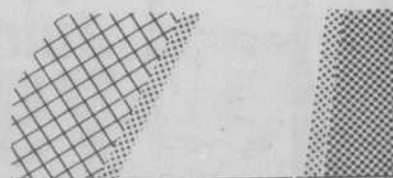
Workshop teaches basic layout for developing flyers, posters
