Ducks shoot down Wildcats

TUCSON, Ariz. (AP) — Poor free throw shooting cost Oregon last Saturday against Arizona State, but some clutch performances at the line Monday night gave the Ducks an 86-84 victory over Arizona.

Reserve guard Mike Matheson sank seven free throws in the final 1:41 as Oregon hung on to beat the Wildcats in a regionally televised Pac-10 Conference basketball game here.

"To come back and win it from the foul line showed a lot of class on our part," said Duck coach Jim Haney, whose squad lost 54-52 in Tempe after making just eight of 22 free throw attempts. "Our history has been to shoot free throws well and it was good to see us come back."

The visiting Ducks, after leading 36-29 at halftime, shot 86 percent from the floor in the second half to hold off the Wildcats, who lost their

eighth straight game and fifth in a row at home.

Arizona, making 62 percent of its field goal attempts, closed to within four points five times down the stretch but could not overtake Oregon.

"We are not doing the things needed to win," said first-year Wildcat coach Ben Lindsey. "This time, it was poor free throw shooting."

Matheson hit 10 of his 12 points in the game from the line as the Ducks converted 32 of 39 free throw chances. The Wildcats, meanwhile, made just 20 of 33 attempts.

Puntus Wilson had a game-high 25 points while Frank Smith added 19 and Donald Mellon 12 for Arizona, which is now 3-14 overall and 0-7 in the Pac-10.

Oregon, 7-10 overall and 3-5 in league play, got 24 points from Gary Gatewood, 18 from Blair Rasmussen and 12 from Jerry Adams.

Wrestlers knock down WSU

Victories, especially come-from-behind victories, have been few and far between for the Oregon wrestlers this season.

But Sunday afternoon at McArthur Court, the Ducks got both a victory and a come-from-behind victory at that as Oregon beat Washington State 25-19 in a Pac-10 dual

meet, lifting the Duck dual meet record to 6-7 for the year.

The meet started off as expected with Oregon 118-pounder Mike Erb pinning Eric Powers in 35 seconds and 126-pound Duck Miles Hancock beating Kevin Higa 12-1.

Washington State won the next two matches before Oregon's 150-pounder Jim Hildebrand beat WSU's Michael Dotson in a close match 8-7. Willie Dillon, Steve Porter and Dan Day each recorded the next three victories for the Cougars giving Washington State a 19-13 advantage heading into the meet's final two matches — 190 pounds and heavyweight.

At 190, Oregon freshman Brett Hamilton found the right time to record the biggest win of his career by pinning WSU's Oscar Hicks in 3:57. Only 1:11 showed on the clock when Hamilton, now 8-5 on the season, scored a two-point takedown and eight seconds later the match was history.

It didn't take long for Oregon heavyweight Dan Cook to put the wraps on the come-from-behind win. Cook, who has been sidelined the past four weeks with a dislocated elbow, pinned Washington State's Wendall

Ellis at the 1:08 mark of the first round to pick up the victory, his eighth this season against no defeats.

"I had gotten the clearance for Dan to wrestle just before the match," explained Duck wrestling coach Ron Finley. "I felt I needed my veteran in there at the end if the meet was on the line."

Finley also added that he plans to use Cook just sparingly until the Pac-10 championships late next month in Corvallis.

It was a busy weekend for the Duck grapplers. On Saturday, Oregon took part in the Portland State Invitational in Portland and finished in sixth place.

There was some good news for the Ducks at the Portland State meet as Erb won the individual at 118 pounds. Erb beat three opponents before pinning Portland State's Anthony Amado in 3:40 in post the championship.

Hildebrand, at 150 pounds, also won three matches but lost to Steve Kluver of Northern Idaho 13-4 in the championship match at 150.

Southern Oregon won the team title with 59 points, while host Portland State was second with 56.

Coach quits

Andy Christoff, defensive coordinator for the Oregon football team for four years, has resigned to take a similar post at Stanford.

Christoff will perform defensive coordinator duties on the Cardinal staff even though last year's defensive coordinator Larry MacDuff remains on head coach Paul Wiggins' staff.

Oregon coach Rich Brooks will now have to fill another hole on his coaching staff. Offensive coordinator Erik Widmark was fired and replaced by former University of Pacific head coach Bob Toledo following last season.

Christoff came to Oregon from Idaho six years ago when Brooks took over as head coach. He spent the last four coordinating one of the Pac-10 Conference's most respected defenses.

ASU's Scott Pac-10 top player

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Arizona State guard Byron Scott, who totaled 50 points in two games, has been named Pac-10 basketball Player of the Week, the conference announced Monday.

The 6-foot-4 junior from Inglewood, Calif., took over the conference scoring lead after scoring 31 points in a loss to

Oregon State and adding 19 in an Arizona State victory over Oregon. He raised his scoring average to 22.4 points per game.

Scott made 17 of 31 field goal attempts and 16 of 20 foul shots last week. He also had 20 rebounds, six assists and six steals while playing 78 of a possible 80 minutes.

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
