Police storm Kahl's farmhouse

HEATON, N.D. (AP) — About 100 police officers, using a National Guard armored personnel carrier and firing tear gas, stormed a farmhouse Tuesday in a futile search for a "fanatic" tax protester suspected of killing two U.S. marshals.

"We have searched the house and there is no evidence of the fugitive in there," said FBI agent Richard Blay. He declined to say whether authorities found evidence that Kahl had spent any time in the house since the slayings Sunday.

Authorities using a bullhorn pleaded with the suspect, 63-year-old Gordon Kahl, to surrender, but there was no reply.

"In view of the stories we've heard about him, he is obviously heavily armed and he knows how to use them," said Blay. "There is no way we can be over-cautious with this type of individual."

The search focused on the farm when officers spotted

tracks leading out of a grove of trees across the road. The tracks led to a car which authorities said was stolen at the scene of Sunday's shootout.

Kahl, 63, described as a member of a paramilitary group called Posse Comitatus, had vowed to friends and acquaintances not to be taken alive.

"I'm not going to let them take me again," Kahl was quoted as saying shortly before he got into

a shootout with U.S. marshals who tried to arrest him for violating probation imposed in a 1977 tax evasion case.

Another man suspected in the slayings, Scott Faul, 29, of Harvey, was arrested Monday night in nearby Fessenden, N.D., said U.S. Attorney Rodney Webb. Four others, including Kahl's wife and son, were arrested earlier on federal murder charges.

WPPSS default threatens other Northwest nuclear power plants

WASHINGTON (AP) — Default on billions of dollars in bonds sold to finance construction of nuclear power plants in the Northwest might threaten the ability of local governments throughout the nation to sell their own bonds, a Wall Street analyst told a House subcommittee Tuesday.

The Washington Public Power Supply System has money on hand to meet a \$94 million interest payment due in July, but the system's ability to make subsequent payments, including one due Jan. 1, 1984, is less certain.

"A default of this dimension could have consequences which are yet incomprehensible," said Howard Sitzer of Thomson McKinnon Securities Inc., of New York City.

He raised the prospect of bond authorities throughout the nation — cities and, particularly, other utilities — having trouble finding buyers for their bonds if Washington Public Power winds up not being able to pay.

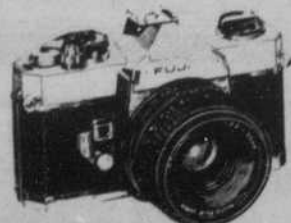
However, Eileen Titmuss, of Drexel Burnham Lambert Inc., also of New York, said she doubted the effect would be as widespread as Sitzer predicted, although potential new bond "issues in the Northwest might have more difficulty than those in other regions."

Rep. James Weaver, D-Ore., head of the subcommittee that conducted the hearing, said he believes the Bonneville Power Administration is illegally raising its rates to help pay for the plants.

The Bonneville Power Administration has contracted to buy two plants and 70 percent of a third and is thus responsible for a substantial portion of the outstanding debt.

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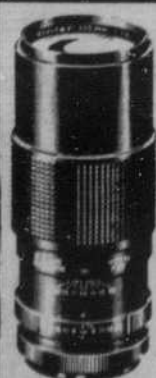
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TO FORMER COMMUNITY COLLEGE STUDENTS
