

Board may be giving directors stipends

An annual \$180 stipend will be given to each student member of the University Bookstore board of directors if the student body approves a proposed change in the bylaws during the May 5-6 bookstore elections.

Arms control workshop set

A weeklong in-depth examination of nuclear arms control concludes Saturday as 12 University professors review issues from the viewpoints of their own areas of study.

Two panel discussions will take place at the First United Methodist Church, 1376 Olive St.

The first panel at 9:45 a.m. will review "National Perspectives on Nuclear Arms Limitations." Profs. Roger Chickering, Joseph Escherick and George Sheridan of the history department will speak.

Profs. Clarence Thurber, international studies, and Joseph Fisman and George Zaninovich, political science, will also participate.

The second panel, "Strategic and Economic Implications of Nuclear Arms Reduction," will begin at 11:30 a.m.

The workshop is sponsored by the Lane County League of Women Voters and an informal faculty arms control committee.

LTD bus fares rise a nickel

The cost of a bus ride in Eugene will go up from 50 to 55 cents starting Sunday, according to the Lane Transit District.

LTD approved the fare hike earlier this year to help pay for higher operating costs and to build a stronger financial base for the bus system.

The five-cent increase will affect only adult fares. Discount tokens and monthly passes will remain at the same price. Children and senior citizen fares will also remain the same.

Current prices are \$2.25 for five tokens and \$18 for a monthly pass.

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The proposal would not benefit the eight students currently on the board, says bookstore manager Jim Williams. If approved, the proposal would take effect in the 1984-85 fiscal year, he says.

The student body defeated a proposal several years ago to pay board members a minimum wage. The proposal was defeated because it benefited current board members, Williams says.

The stipend would amount to

\$20 per month during the nine-month school year, but Williams says board members devote at least 11 hours a month to board and committee meetings.

"That amounts to only \$1.80 an hour," he adds.

The board will vote on a proposed 10 percent discount on all books at its March 29 meeting. If approved, students and faculty would be required to show University identification to receive the discount, which would begin July 1.
