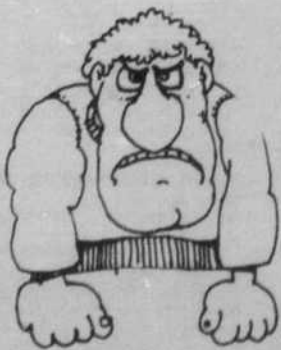

Bomb threat empties library

A few hundred disgruntled students filed out of the library Sunday night at 8:45 p.m. after a bomb threat was called in claiming the library would blow up at 9:15 p.m.

No bomb was found.

Most students were not concerned — except about their finals. "Right before dead week, this is really mean," said one student.

This was the second bomb threat in the past two weeks. Two phone threats forced the evacuation of Gilbert Hall on Feb. 22. There was a bomb found in that incident. Campus public safety officer Al Young said he did not know if

the two incidents were related.

The library reopened at 9:30 p.m., but circulation desk personnel said most of the students had gone home after they left the library and estimated only about 20 students re-entered the library.

The threat was called into the reference desk at the library. A male voice said "I just want to let you know a there is a bomb in the library that will go off at 9:15," according to reference librarian Rose Marie Service, who answered the phone.

She said while she thought it was a "dead week prank,"

library personnel decided they would not take any chances and called campus security.

Service said the man spoke softly and slowly and seemed to have no accent.

Students Dickson Dangers, Dan McFall and Mark Rosenheim said they heard rumors the Oregon Daily Emerald was calling in the bomb threats so the paper would have more interesting stories.

Emerald Editor Harry Esteve said it was "ridiculous" to accuse the Emerald of calling in the threats. "We have plenty of news without making up news of our own," he said.
