'Soviets' score on U.S. Army

WASHINGTON (AP) — A simulated Soviet regiment has scored many victories over U.S. Army units seriously lacking "important 'go-to-war' skills" in mock battles at the National Training Center in California, officials said Monday.

"They win many of them," said Lt. Col. Dave Mooney when asked about reports that a training regiment made up of American soldiers using Soviet tactics and Soviet-type equipment has outgunned U.S. Army tank and mechanized infantry outfits.

Mooney, a spokesman for the Army Forces Command which supervises training, said he did not have any scores which would reflect the margin of victory for the "Soviet" regiment.

At the same time, Mooney acknowledged that a report prepared by the Forces Command said "there is a lack of demonstrated tank crew and anti-tank gunner capability" to destroy enemy targets.

According to this report, the record of 10 Army task forces which exercised at the Fort Irwin center last year disclosed "a significant shortfall in important 'go-to-war' skills."

Among other things, observers criticized

the failure of unit commanders to order their infantrymen to leave their armored personnel carriers and assault "enemy" positions when the units ran into heavy anti-tank missile opposition.

U.S. Army units are sent to the California training center for two weeks of field maneuvers, including what is designed as realistic combat against "opposing forces."

The principal opposition in the mock battles is provided by a simulated Soviet regiment of about 1,200 men and 150 fighting vehicles built around three motorized rifle battalions, a T-72 tank battalion and supporting units.

In attempting to explain why the simulated Soviet regiment did so well against the Army tank and mechanized infantry units, Mooney said the "Soviet" outfit has "home court advantage" in that it trains in the Fort Irwin area for about 140 days a year while the visiting Army battalions are there for only two weeks and thus are not familiar with the terrain.

However, Mooney said even the defeats have their positive side in that the training "identifies weak points and they go home knowing what they have to work on."

Jobs bill passes unanimously

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate Appropriations Committee gave unanimous approval Monday to a \$3.9 billion package of recession relief, a full \$1 billion less than the Democratic-controlled House approved last week for jobs and humanitarian assistance.

The measure, which also provides \$5 billion to assure continued payment of unemployment benefits, is expected to come up for debate in the full Senate later in the week. Easy passage is expected, although Sen. Mark Hatfield, the Oregon Republican who chairs the committee, said he would attempt to reduce spending on the jobs portion of the bill by about \$373 million to accommodate the wishes of Pres. Ronald Reagan.

The bill was adopted by voice vote in the Republican-controlled committee as the

panel took steps to make sure the funds are targeted to areas of high unemployment.

In all, about \$2.1 billion will be distributed on the basis of unemployment, and under the complicated formula adopted, 15 states will benefit particularly. The 15, all of which had unemployment higher than the national average for all of 1982, include Alabama, Illinois, Indiana, Kentucky, Louisiana, Michigan and Mississippi. Also on the list are Ohio, Oregon, Pennsylvania, South Carolina, Tennessee, Washington, West Virginia and Wisconsin.

Despite the amendment, drafted by Hatfield and Democrats John Stennis of Mississippi and Robert Byrd of West Virginia, some members complained about "pork" being a part of the bill. Sen. Tom Eagleton, D-Mo., noted that some of the funds

were earmarked for states represented by influential committee members.

"Take them all out," he said, and allow all the money to be allocated on the basis of national need. But there was no move by any committee member to strip out provisions that he referred to.

In general, the bill contains slightly more money for social services and less for traditional "brick and mortar" construction jobs than the House-passed bill.

But there also are items such as \$263 million for construction of Veterans' Administration hospitals; \$155 million for various railroad projects and \$470 million for the Corps of Engineers; Bureau of Reclamation and Tennessee Valley Authority, all of which will be spent on jobs-creating construction projects.

SEATTLE (AP) — Fishermen from Alaska and the Pacific

The Alaska Seafood Marketing Institute contributed three troll-caught red king salmon for the feast at the Westin Hotel, said Linda Chaves-Michael, deputy chief of the National Marine Fisheries Service in Seattle. The salmon ranged in size from 16 to 18 pounds each.

The fish were caught in Southeast Alaska last week by the Silver Lining Co. of Ketchikan, said Chaves-Michael, adding, "The winter troll season is open."

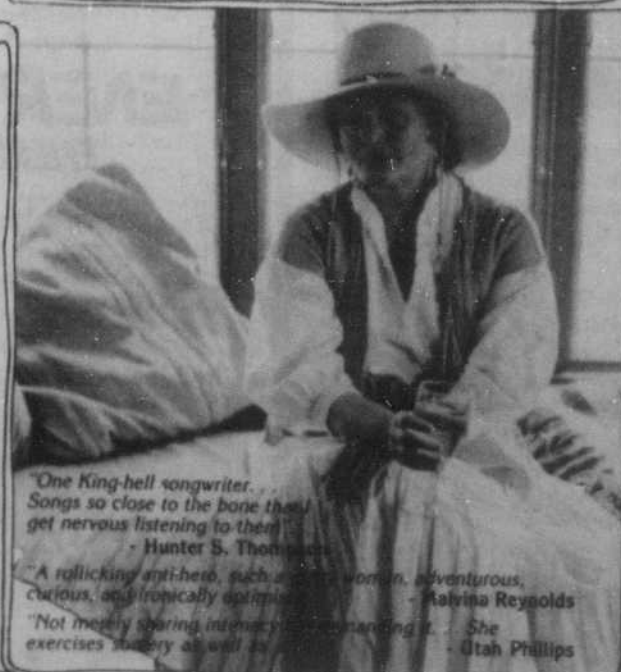
