

Haney, Finley up for new positions

One Oregon coach took on a new position while a former coach may be up for a new job.

Duck wrestling coach Ron Finley was named to coach the United States at the Olympics in 1984, while former basketball coach Jim Haney was named as a finalist for the coaching position at Montana State.

Finley has been picked to be the Greco-Roman coach by

the USA-Wrestling association, the governing body of the sport. The House of Delegates of the United States Olympic Committee is expected to confirm the selection of Finley in its meeting April 15-17.

Haney, who resigned Feb. 23 as the Oregon mentor, is one of six finalist for the Montana State job. Former MSU coach, Bruce Haroldson had resigned earlier.

Hawks skate by Breakers

SEATTLE (AP) — Portland center Ken Yermchuk had one goal and three assists as the Winter Hawks opened their playoff lead to 2-0 Monday with a 7-4 victory over the Seattle Breakers.

The Breakers jumped to a 2-0 lead early in the first period but the Winter Hawks scrambled

ed back to tie it 2-2 before the first intermission. Portland led 4-2 at the end of the second period and stretched its lead to as much as 6-2 before settling for the 7-4 final verdict.

Winter Hawk wingers Grant Sasser and Cam Neely had two goals apiece.

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Bryant makes USFL forget about Walker

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Kelvin Bryant is running away from Herschel Walker and the rest of the United States Football League. But he's not one to let his success run away with him.

"I'm just trying to do my job," says the Philadelphia Stars' 6-foot-2, 195-pound rookie from North Carolina, who signed for an estimated \$2 million over four years and was the highest paid player in the USFL until Walker signed with the New Jersey Generals in late February.

"I'd just like for people to look at me as o.c. Kevin Bryant. I'd like for Herschel to do his thing, and I'll do mine."

Bryant is the USFL's leading rusher, with 454 yards on 91 carries. He had 112 yards in 22 carries Sunday and broke four tackles on a 38-yard pass play for the Stars' final touchdown in a 27-22 loss to Tampa Bay. The loss, Philadelphia's first, left the Bandits as the USFL's only unbeaten team.

"He's a hard-nosed runner and a great competitor," said Tampa Bay cornerback Jeff George.

But Bryant says: "I don't look at myself as the only one to generate the offense. The offensive line opens up the holes, and I just run through."

As a high school freshman at Tarboro,

N.C., Bryant ran for a touchdown the first time he got the football in his team's season opener. He was the state 100-yard dash champion as a junior and piled up 1,420 yards rushing as a senior.

At North Carolina, he recorded three 1,000-yard seasons although he was slowed by a sprained ankle his senior year.

"The big question was about his durability," says Carl Peterson, the Stars' president and general manager. "He's had small injuries that have taken him away from the game. But he's a much tougher runner than most people think."

Bryant left Sunday's game briefly with bruised ribs, but returned to score the final touchdown. He said he would be ready for practice Monday.

He said he signed with the USFL because he liked the money and wanted a chance to be a starter.

"The Stars offense reminds me of North Carolina's," he said. "But I didn't do as much blocking in college. I still think I can get better at that."

"I know a lot of people are saying this league is not going to make it, but it's got a lot of good players, a lot of people who love to win."

Denver's good as gold, ask Oakland

DENVER (AP) — Quarterback Ken Johnson passed for two touchdowns and running back Harry Sydney rushed for 83 yards and another score, powering the Denver Gold to a 22-12 victory over the penalty-plagued Oakland Invaders Monday night in United States Football League action.

Denver's victory, before an announced crowd of 38,720, produced a four-way tie for the lead in the Pacific Division among Denver, Oakland, Los Angeles, and Arizona * all at 2-2.

The first half, played in rain that gradually changed to light snow, saw the Gold score on

its first two possessions to take a 15-0 lead at intermission.

Sydney carried on the first four plays from scrimmage for a total of 38 yards to help set up Johnson's 10-yard toss to tight end Bob Niziolek for a touchdown with 10:42 left in the first quarter.

Oakland, assessed 13 penalties for 107 yards, rallied for a pair of fourth-quarter scores. Fred Besana passed 8 yards to running back Arthur Whittington with 10:03 left, then found tight end Raymond Chester on a 16-yard scoring strike with 4:21 remaining.

Women serve up wins

The Oregon men's and women's tennis teams appear to be moving in opposite directions. The Duck women have posted an impressive 5-0 record so far, while the men encountered tough times on a six-match road swing through Southern California, losing five matches.

The women have picked up decisive victories over Nevada-Reno, Puget Sound and Oregon State.

Coach Nancy Osborne points north to Seattle and the University of Washington as the team for the women to beat in the Northern Division of the NorPac Conference.

The Ducks will get their chance April 22 when they take on the Huskies and Washington State, another top Northwest team according to Osborne. The outcome of those two matches will probably determine who will make the trip to the NorPac championships at Berkeley.

While the women have had early success, the men's team is getting a taste of tennis Southern California style. On a six-match road trip since March 21, the Ducks have lost to 15th-ranked Cal-Irvine 7-2, Long Beach State 9-0, and a tough decision to Cal-State-Dominquez Hills 5-4.

Golfers tee off

The Oregon golf team warmed up for today's Western Intercollegiate Tournament by finishing sixth at the Northern California Intercollegiate tournament last weekend in Stockton.

The 54-hole tournament runs through Thursday down the road in Santa Cruz.

Sophomore Paul Weinhold, a Medford product, led the Ducks with a three-day total of 220.

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
