Faire offers health services, stress tests

Free blood pressure tests, vision assessments and lung-volume capacity measurements are among the services available at the University's eighth annual Health Faire next week.

The main event is set for Tuesday from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. in Room 167 of the EMU.

More than 40 health agen-

cies and groups will participate in the fair, which will include displays, information booths and equipment demonstrations.

The school and community health education department is co-sponsoring the event along with the Oregon Student Association for the Advancement of Health Education.

"The fair is here to help get people to take responsibility for their own health," said Paul Schroeder, the event organizer.

Also scheduled are a

number of health-related seminars on topics such as depression, weight control and stress management.

Seminars set for Monday include "Understanding Depression," from 3:30 to 5 p.m., and "Psychological Aspects of Weight," from 7 to 9 p.m., both in the Dad's Room.

On Tuesday the seminar topics include "Stress Management Techniques," offered at 9:30 and 10:30 a.m. and 1:30 and 2:30 p.m. in Room 108 and 109 EMU, "Exercise Programs," from 7 to 9 p.m. in Rooms 110-111 EMU, and "In-

dividual Food Choice: the Impact on Ourselves and Society," at 7 or 8:30 p.m. in Rooms 110-111 EMU.

Pre-registration is required for the seminars, which are open to the public.

Board OKs EMU budget increase

An EMU Board committee voted Tuesday to send a proposed 1983-84 budget of almost \$1.2 million dollars to the Incidental Fee Committee for its approval.

By a vote of 4-1, the budget committee approved \$1,178,029, an increase of

about \$116,000 over this year's budget, mainly due to increased utility and salary costs.

Committee member Mary Shrauger, also an IFC member, was the sole dissenter on the budget, which would increase each student's EMU support by \$2.50 per term.

The board approved the budget as drawn up during earlier meetings, and discussion at Tuesday's meeting concentrated on possible IFC reaction to EMU Board stipends and the overall budget.

Board stipends, which total \$2,581 this year, would decrease \$291 — or about 12 percent — to \$2,290 under the proposed budget. Three of four members receiving stipends would be paid for eight months instead of nine.

"In view of cuts other programs have been taking, I think that's reasonable," said committee member Dan Cohen. If stipends are cut further, students not receiving stipends should get them, Cohen said.

Shrauger said she can't predict fellow IFC members' reactions to stipend levels.

"Stipends are only a gift. They aren't wages. God knows, we don't do it for the money."

EMU Board Chairer John Dulcich predicted IFC approval of the budget.
