

Police beat



Recently reported campus-area crimes included the following:

A Sheldon Hall resident was arrested Tuesday in Miami, Fla., for first-degree theft after he apparently forged some checks and stole an undetermined amount of money, according to the Eugene Police Department.

The suspect, 32-year-old Roy Gene Elbie, was apprehended in Miami International Airport. Bail was set at \$15,000, said Sgt. Rick Allison of the Eugene Police. Elbie will be lodged in the Lane County Jail.

Cassette tape players and architecture equipment worth about \$550 were reported stolen from Lawrence Hall over spring break, said Officer Bob Holland.

Holland said the thefts may be related to other property reported stolen from Emerald Hall during the same time period. Two South Eugene High School students were arrested in connection with those thefts.

Most of the property belonged to architecture students who locked the tape players in their wooden desks, Holland said. He warned students not to keep expensive equipment in the desks

because the locks can be easily broken.

Police cited Roger William Wyatt, 33, for carrying a concealed weapon near 15th Avenue and Agate Street about 2 p.m. Sunday.

A vacuum cleaner and a bicycle were among articles reported stolen from a residence at 1672 Columbia St. on March 30. Police estimated the value of the stolen property at \$482.

Three wallets were reported stolen from backpacks in the library this week, and three more wallets were reported taken from the EMU, said Allison.

Two students turned in money they found on campus in two separate incidents, said Allison. One student found \$150 in cash, and another found a wallet containing \$250.

A Deady Hall vending machine was discovered broken into on Monday morning, said Officer Gary Elliott. A coin box containing about \$12 was reported missing. Elliott said the theft probably occurred sometime last Friday.

Six bicycles were reported stolen since last Friday, police said.

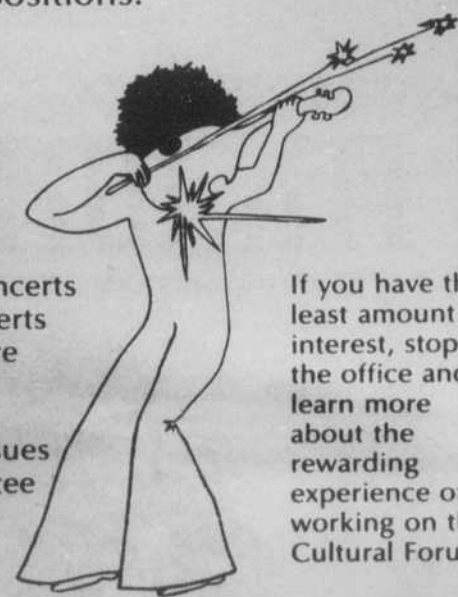

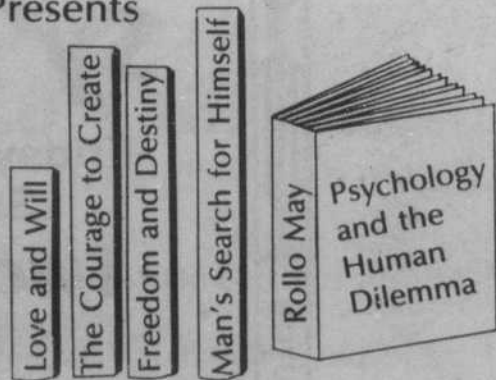
