Holocaust survivors searching

WASHINGTON (AP) — Hundreds of survivors of Nazi death camps lined up Monday before computer terminals to register their names for history and to continue to search for kinfolk and friends who vanished in the Holocaust.

Others, at a gathering of Americans and Canadians who were liberated 38 years ago used more direct means. Martin Statfield, 62, a retired grocer from Brooklyn, N. Y., held a hand-lettered sign aloft in the Washington Convention Center that said: "Looking for Janek from Krakow presently living in Canada. We were in 1945 in Wells-Austria. We had a common friend Ender. We both escaped from the police station in Wells."

Statfield explained to questioners that he met Janek after the liberation and while both were waiting to be returned to their native Poland.

"I told him I'll never go back to Poland because of the bitter memories. All my family was destroyed. We jumped from the police station window. Later, Janek decided to go back and I made my way to Italy. I was going to immigrate to Palestine. I got a letter from my relatives in Newark, N.J., and they arranged for me to come to this country."

The meeting, the first of its kind in America among the estimated 100,000 survivors in this country, formally opened Monday night with an address from Pres. Ronald Reagan to the estimated 10,000 survivors and their children attending the session, known as the American Gathering of Jewish Holocaust

Survivors.

In a written message to all who attended, Reagan underscored one of the purposes of the event: a reminder to the world of Hitler's attempt to exterminate all the Jews of Europe.

"There is a need for the personal witness which only survivors can provide as testimony to the tragic events of the past and their relevance to all humanity for the present and future," the president wrote.

"This gathering will heighten our awareness of the events that led to the Holocaust and serve to renew our commitment to a moral vision that will never permit such atrocities again."

An organizer said the meeting should serve as a reminder to the world that what happened during World War II can happen again.

"We have a tremendous story to tell the world — not for our sake but for the sake of the world — that it should never be repeated," said Benjamin Meed, president of the American Gathering of Jewish Holocaust Survivors, sponsor of the events.

The most important aspect of the gathering will be "a lesson to the world that it can happen again if we will not be watchful," said Meed, a Polish-born Jew who fought in the Warsaw ghetto uprising in 1943.

In addition to reunions, seminars and cultural events, the program will include an address by Reagan and a ceremony to present the keys of two government buildings on the Mall that will house a permanent Holocaust memorial and museum.

Senate defeats gay rights bill

SALEM (AP) — A so-called "gay rights" bill that would have outlawed discrimination against homosexuals went down to defeat Monday in the Oregon Senate.

The vote was another setback for gay rights activists, who for 10 years have been pushing for such a law in Oregon. After the vote, a member of a gay rights group said his organization would work to defeat the senators who voted against the bill.

The bill would have forbidden discrimination based on sexual orientation in housing, employment and public accommodations.

Democratic Sen. Jim Gardner of Portland termed the measure, which was rejected 17-13, "another battlefield in the lengthy campaign for equal justice."

"These people are an unpopular minority," he said. "That's why they need the protection of the law. The louder the clamoring against the bill, the stronger the case for its passage."

But Senate Republican Leader Tony Meeker of Amity said SB319 would set up a "special minority for special protection" and called the proposal a step toward "driving

the majority away from society."

Gardner said the measure wouldn't affect marriage laws and or prevent employers from firing homosexuals whose private lives interfered with their jobs.

Sen. Margie Hendriksen, D-Eugene, said the bill also could protect heterosexuals who are harassed because of their sexual inclinations.

At a news conference after the Senate vote, Jerry Weller of Portland, a member of the Gay Rights National Lobby, said the group would "target" some senators for defeat in the next elections.

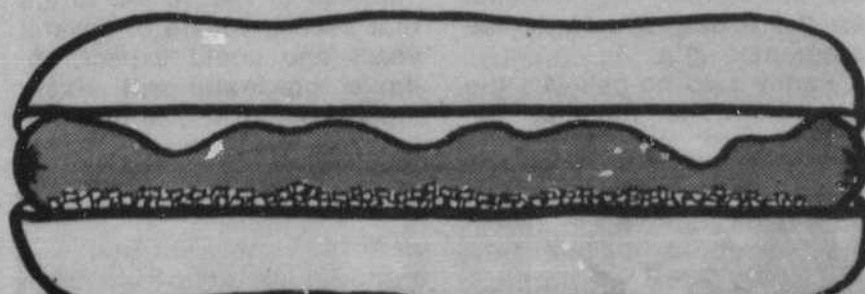
