

Inactive group's funding eliminated by committee

The Incidental Fee Committee eliminated funding Thursday for the Physically Limited Union of Students/ALERT because the group is inactive.

The IFC rescinded a \$141 program allocation it made in March after the committee had finished student program budget hearings. The money was allocated for administrative expenses, including the purchase of a large-print typing ball.

The fact that members of Suite 1 programs park their bicycles in the group's office space shows it is nonexistent, said Jeff Nudelman, IFC vice chair. No one is ever in the office, Nudelman added.

The EMU House Committee revoked the group's office space Tuesday because of inactivity. The EMU committee had placed PLUS/ALERT on probation from February to April because of prior inactivity.

IFC Chairer Betzy Fry said program Director Lynne McKinney decided the group has too little money to be active. McKinney requested more than \$3,000 at the March budget hearing, saying this year's \$435 budget is not enough to keep the program viable.

The committee allotted the group a smaller budget for next year because of prior organizational difficulties. Former program Director Chester Faller left the group

after last year's IFC refused to fund a lawsuit against the State Board of Education.

"Without the lawsuit, there is no reason for PLUS to exist — period," Faller said at last year's budget hearing.

In an April 26 memorandum, Fry suggested David Gibson, ASUO vice president for administration and finance, freeze the group's 1982-83 budget for the third time this year until the program "shows real initiative to keep it alive." Gibson froze it Thursday.

In other business, the IFC unanimously approved a resolution that prohibits using incidental fees to print materials in a foreign language unless it has the committee's prior approval. A Muslim Student Association advertisement in the Emerald printed in Arabic prompted the resolution.

The committee eliminated a stipulation in the original resolution draft that allowed groups to print materials in foreign languages if an English translation also appeared in the same literature. IFC member Bart Hill said such a stipulation would double costs.

If groups want to print a foreign translation in addition to an English version, they should pay for it from their own pockets, Hill said. Printing in just a foreign language excludes too many people from understanding the message, he said.

Coping with depression aim of ongoing program

Depressed people can learn new skills to help them cope more effectively with life's problems through an ongoing program offered by the University's Psychology Clinic.

"Coping with Depression," an eight-week course offered in a small group format, will be taught by University doctoral students in clinical or counseling psychology who have

received additional training.

The course is available to the general public on a sliding fee scale of \$100 to \$150. However, those who attend all sessions as well as two follow-up interviews will earn half of their fee back.
