

Outstanding students win awards

Eight individual students and a living group at the University were honored for their outstanding achievements Saturday during the annual Parents' Weekend awards luncheon.

The first recipient of the N. Ray Hawk Award for the outstanding senior was R. Patrick Hanlin, a finance, management and speech major from Medford.

Gary Okazaki, a junior finance major from Portland, won the Maurice Harold Hunter Leadership Scholarship, while Hilary Gerdes, a junior psychology major from Portland, was picked for the the Bess Templeton Cristman Award. Both are full-tuition grants.

Bart Hill, a junior biology major from Eau Claire, Wis., was awarded the Koyl Cup, and Julie Melander, a senior journalism major from Beaver-

ton, won the Gerlinger Cup. Selected for the AAUW Senior Woman Recognition Award was Allison Snow, a senior general science major from Portland.

Kayth Hayes, a sophomore biology major from Newberg, won the Doyle Higdon Memorial Trophy, while Kevin Lusk, a senior general science major from Seattle, Wash., was the recipient of the Emerald Athletic Award.

The Janet Smith Club, a co-educational cooperative, captured the Burt Brown Barker Vice Presidential Cup for the living group with the highest undergraduate grade point index. The men and women of Smith Club compiled a 2.95 GPI — which differs from the traditional grade point average in that "N" (not passing)

grades are taken into account — during fall and winter terms to earn the award.

Hanlin, the Ray Hawk Award recipient, is the vice president of Mortar Board, a national honor society for seniors, and serves as a resident assistant representative on the University Residence Hall Governance Council and as a member of the University's Academic Standards Committee. A Dean's Scholar, he has been a youth coach for Babe Ruth baseball and is active in intramural sports.

Okazaki, who received the Hunter Leadership Scholarship, has been active in OSPIRG and the Asian American Student Union. A Mortar Board Honor Scholar, he is coordinator of special events and editor of Fiji Web-footer for Phi Gamma Delta fraternity.

Gerdes, who won the Cristman Award, is the University peer advising coordinator for pre-majors and serves on the Faculty Advising Committee. A member of the psychology department honors program, she has been scholarship chairman for Kappa Alpha Theta sorority and reads for a blind student.

Hill, who received the Koyl Cup, chairs the IFC committee and has been president of Alpha Lambda Delta freshman honor society. A Mortar Board Honor Scholar and recipient of a Centurion Award, he is secretary of the campus Circle-K service group.

Melander, the Gerlinger Cup holder, has been a resident assistant and held several residence hall student government board positions. A Mortar Board Honor Scholar, she has been on the Dean's List, is

an Oregon Achiever, and served in the New Student Host Program while also participating in a community aerobics program and serving as a peer adviser for journalism students.

Snow, who received the AAUW award, is president of Kappa Alpha Theta sorority and cross country representative for the Order of the "O" letterman's club. A Deans' Scholar and member of Mortar Board, she has lettered four years in varsity cross country and track.

Hayes, the Higdon trophy winner, is the collegiate record holder in the 5,000 meters and formerly held the 3,000-meter collegiate mark.

Lusk, who won the Emerald Athletic Award, has played quarterback for Duck football teams since 1979. In 1980, as a sophomore, he completed 64 percent of his passes and last fall he won the Elmer Sahlstrom Award which goes to the senior with a high academic average and exemplary attitude.

Hatfield blames business, Reagan for timber woes

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. Mark Hatfield is blaming "a few" timber companies and the Reagan administration for thwarting his federal timber contract relief legislation.

But the Oregon Republican pledged Monday that "come hell or high water" he is still ready to help economically depressed mills find a way out of their pre-1982 federal tree harvesting agreements.

Hatfield, who chairs the Senate Appropriations Committee, said he hopes to link his timber contract measure to an Oregon wilderness bill that he also will sponsor.

Merit scholarship awarded

The University Parents' Association awarded a \$600 merit scholarship to Daniel Cohen on Saturday during the Parents' Weekend awards luncheon.

Cohen, who was recently elected chairman of the EMU board of directors, was chosen to receive the award based on his scholarship, leadership ability, motivation and contributions to the University and the community.

Cohen is a senior majoring in economics and mathematics and a Dean's Scholar.

Chairman of the Honors College Student Advisory Board, Cohen plans to do graduate work in operations research, using mathematical models and economic principles to solve complex problems.

He is treasurer of Mortar Board and a member of Friars, both senior honor societies. He also has been inducted into Druids, a service honorary for juniors, and into Phi Eta Sigma, a freshman honor group.

Cohen competed on the second-place team in the 1982 all-campus College Bowl tournament and has won various awards for forensics.

Cohen took over the EMU board position after his predecessor resigned to accept out-of-state employment. He will serve through the summer and expects to run again next fall.
