Court reinstates herbicide ban

EUGENE (AP) — A federal appeals court in San Francisco has reinstated a ban on herbicide spraying in the Siuslaw National Forest and the Eugene district of the U.S. Bureau of Land Management, a lawyer for plaintiffs in the case said.

John Bonine, co-director of the Environmental Law Clinic at the University Law School, said the appeals panel renewed a ban lifted last Thursday by U.S. District Judge Robert Belloni in Eugene.

The 9th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals prohibited the spraying pending resolution of a government appeal of related decisions by Belloni. Those rulings directed officials to carry out studies on the herbicide spraying's health effects, Bonine said.

Because the court tentatively scheduled hearings on those appeals in September, Wednesday's ruling means spraying scheduled for this spring and summer will not take place.

Both federal agencies use herbicides to kill brush that impedes the growth of young, potentially marketable trees.

Two environmental groups — Save Our Ecosystems and Citizens for Alternatives to Toxic Spraying — sought the injunction to block spraying in the BLM district. Paul Merrell, who lives in Tidewater near the Siuslaw forest, sought the spray ban in the national forest. Fifteen residents later joined Merrell in the case.

"Everyone is flabbergasted and happy," Merrell said. "We danced around the living room for about 45 minutes straight. We were prepared for the helicopters. We were going to move out to Eugene this week to avoid the spraying."

Lawyers on Friday filed an emergency motion appealing Belloni's lifting of the ban. "The issues involve evidence of cancer, birth defects and gene mutations," Bonine said.

Belloni had said the spraying could resume because "the harm to the reproduction of small trees in the forest would be great" if the ban remained in effect.

He did not change orders directing the U.S. Forest Service and the BLM to conduct research proving that the use of the herbicides would not be harmful. He also required the BLM to prepare a more adequate "worst case" scenario on the impact of the spraying.

Bonine said the Forest Service and the BLM could control brush using manual labor hired under terms of a jobs bill passed by Congress. "There will be no effect (on tree reproduction) if the government immediately moves to hire forest workers for brush control," he said.

There was no answer to telephone calls at the Siuslaw National Forest's Corvallis office or at the BLM's Eugene district office Wednesday evening.
