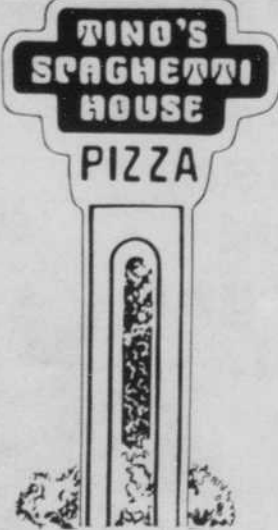


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Reagan wins summit 'gamble'

WILLIAMSBURG, Va. (AP) — Pres. Ronald Reagan won "a very big gamble" on allied harmony Monday as the leaders of major industrialized democracies pledged to seek lower inflation and interest rates while limiting government spending to reduce budget deficits.

Ending their two-day summit on a note of declared harmony after resolving earlier disputes over nuclear missile deployment and monetary policy, the heads of state agreed that a joint course was needed to spread economic recovery to all countries.

Asked at a news conference about Reagan's performance, Canadian Prime Minister Pierre Trudeau, who contributed to the dispute over arms control, said: "He was taking a very big gamble that we could have an unstructured summit and still produce results. And I must say I had to congratulate him for having won that gamble."

Even so, the allies still were not totally agreed on every issue. West German Chancellor Helmut Kohl said the allied leaders

parted company with Reagan on the question of U.S. budget deficits and their arguments "will certainly not fail to have an impact on American policy."

After reading the joint statement, Reagan said the meetings had shown "confidence that recovery is under way, optimism that it will be durable, and certainty that economic policy... and security ties among us will be strengthened in the future."

He said the sessions would send "a message of hope... to the people of the world, and to future generations."

"Together, the summit partners are facing today's enormous challenges head-on, and not settling for quick fixes," he said.

The agreement was worked out in a final morning session around a large oval conference table at a lounge in the Williamsburg Inn. It was read by Reagan, the summit host and moderator, to members of the official delegations, summit staff members, and reporters in the gymnasium of the College of William and Mary.

Violence, death at US festival

DEVORE, Calif. (AP) — A "wild" crowd hurled rocks and bottles and tore down fences Monday at the US Festival, where one person also was beaten to death and a security guard suffered a fractured skull in a fight with fellow guards.

Authorities said about

300,000 people attended a "heavy metal" concert by Van Halen, and as the concert ended, some people tore down fences, tossed objects at each other and sheriff's deputies and crashed their cars into police cars. They left the hillside site in what one spectator called a "filthy, disgusting mess."

"They were wild when they came out," said San Bernardino County Sheriff's Capt. Philip Schuyler. "We were real fortunate to avert a real disaster."

By Monday night, there had been 125 arrests since the start of the three-day outdoor rock festival at Glen Helen Regional Park. More than half were for felonies ranging from assault to drug sales.

But San Bernardino County

Sheriff Floyd Tidwell said after the concert broke up: "There'd be more crime than that in a big city. The positive news is that things are going pretty well. It could have been worse — no riot problems, no felonious assaults."

At least 2,429 people had sought medical attention at eight first-aid centers and a field hospital. Medical coordinator Dean Grose said only 26 people required hospitalization for injuries ranging from fractures to drug overdoses and heat exposure.

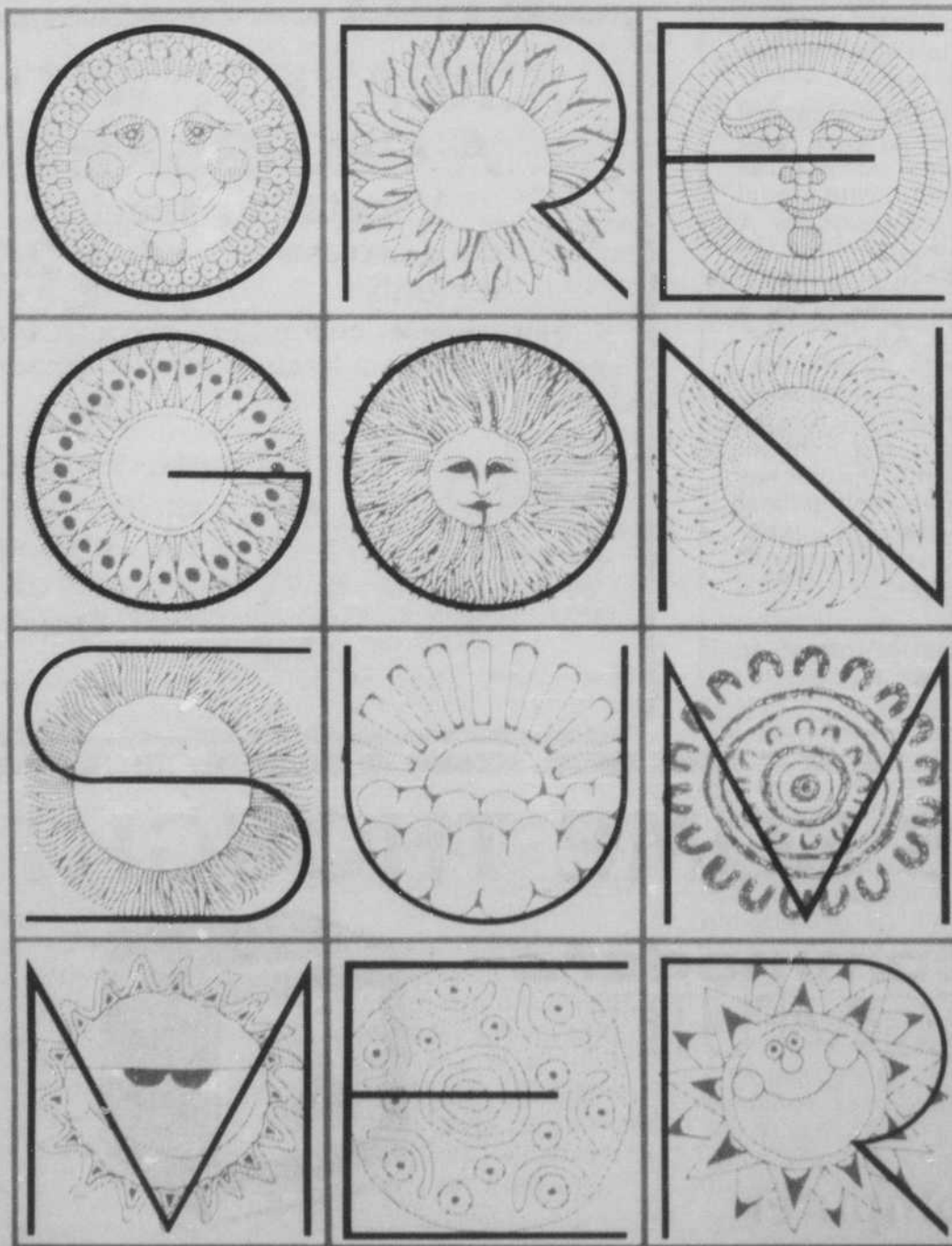
Grose said a 12-year-old San Diego girl suffered fractured ribs and a broken clavicle when she was run over by a car as she slept in a sleeping bag in a parking lot Monday morning.
