

AAAS honors five University researchers

Five University researchers have been elected fellows of the American Association for the Advancement of Science.

Anthropologist C. Melvin Aikens, physicist Bernd Crasemann, neuroscientist Michael Menaker, marine biologist Robert Terwilliger and cell biologist James Weston were among 296 scientists so honored during the AAAS annual meeting in May.

AAAS fellows, now numbering some 16,000 nationwide, are those members "whose ef-

forts on behalf of the advancement of science or its application are scientifically or socially distinguished."

Aikens, who heads the anthropology department and is Oregon State Museum of Anthropology archaeological curator, has been at the University since 1969. He serves on the Oregon State Committee on Historic Preservation.

He was cited for "contributing to the archaeology of western North American and Japan in a way that underscores the unity of

humanity." Born in Ogden, Utah, Aikens is a graduate of Weber College in Utah, and the University of Utah. He also holds master's and doctoral degrees from the University of Chicago.

Crasemann, on sabbatic leave during 1982-83 at the Stanford Synchrotron Radiation Laboratory, has been on the University faculty since 1953 and physics department chair since 1976. He was cited for "important contributions to atomic physics and nuclear physics, including particularly inner shell processes."

Crasemann, vice chair of the National Research Council's Committee on Atomic and Molecular Science, received the University's Ersted Award for distinguished teaching in 1959. He is a graduate of the University of California at Los Angeles and has a doctoral degree from UC-Berkeley.

Menaker, who directs the University Institute of Neuroscience, has been a member of the biology faculty since 1979. He was cited "for contributions in the physiology of circadian systems in the vertebrates."

A graduate of Swarthmore College, he also holds a doctorate from Princeton University. In 1971-72, he was a Guggenheim fellow in France, and he held a National Institute of Health career development award from 1970-75.

Terwilliger, assistant director of the University Institute of Marine Biology at Charleston, has been a member of the biology faculty since 1969. A respiratory physiologist, he was cited for "research on the comparative aspects of the structure of oxygen-carrying proteins."

A native of Hartford, Conn., he is a graduate of Bowdoin College. He also has master's and doctoral degrees from Boston University.

Weston, a University biology professor since 1970, is a graduate of Cornell and Yale universities. Cited for his research on "the migration and differentiation of neural crest cells in avian and murine embryos," he is also interested in the control of morphogenesis in mutant mice.

A Washington, D.C. native, he serves on the National Science Foundation's developmental biology panel and is a member of the medical advisory boards of the Neurofibromatosis and Dysautonomia foundations.

The AAAS, formed in 1848, is the leading general scientific organization in the United States. It currently has some 140,000 individual members and about 300 affiliated scientific societies and academics of science.

Levy would turn on street lights

Eugene School District 4J is requesting \$8.4 million outside its \$41 million tax base for 1983-84 operations, and Springfield is asking for enough money to turn on city street lights.

District 4J leads off the "D" ballot in today's county election, asking for money to "help pay salaries; buy books; buy supplies and instructional equipment; heat, clean and maintain buildings; and pay other costs of educating approximately 17,579 students for one year."

"The tax base of \$41,051,198 is not adequate to meet the operational needs for 1983-84. The tax levy of \$8,433,865 outside the tax base is needed to fund a reduced level of programs in the Eugene School

District for the 1983-84 fiscal year," the ballot measure states.

If the measure passes, about \$1.7 million of the money will be eligible for partial state funding, but the other \$6.7 million will be financed totally by the taxpayers.

Also on today's "D" ballot is a \$660,650 levy for Springfield.

If the measure passes, the city will buy an ambulance, hire three full-time firefighters, three full-time police officers and 1½ animal control officers.

Springfield also will turn street lights back on and restore street sweeping and landscape maintenance if the proposal passes. Library hours will be maintained at 37 hours per week.

Early orientation deadline nears

Friday, July 1, is the sign-up deadline for five sessions of the University's 1983 Early Orientation and Registration Program.

The three evening-and-day program, July 17-18, July 24-25, and July 29-30, and the day-only session on July 23, are open to students already admitted to the University and scheduled to enter classes as freshman this fall.

New this year to the pro-

gram is Transfer Day, a day in which transfer students will be invited to attend a special program. Scheduled for 1-3 p.m. Friday, July 22, the day will focus on credit evaluation and faculty advising. Early registration will not be available to transfer students with 45 or more quarter credit hours.

EORP is designed for students and their parents as an informational introduction to University life. It provides

an opportunity for new students to get special academic advising and to register early for fall term classes.

According to Gregg Lobisser, University orientation director, approximately 2,000 persons are expected to attend the five EORP sessions this year.
