

GTF receives English award

Jill Goodman, a graduate teaching fellow in the University English department, has been named winner of this year's Award for Excellence in the Teaching of Composition.

Goodman was chosen as the outstanding teacher of expository writing and was awarded \$500. She has taught both writing and literature courses since she began graduate study in 1977.

In addition, GTFs Linda Benschel-Meyers, James Caron and Anita Helle were given honorable mention for their excellent teaching

in required undergraduate writing courses.

Goodman is finishing her doctoral degree this summer and will move to Deland, Fla., where she will be an assistant professor at Stetson University. Her dissertation is on dramatic art in the comedies of Ben Jonson.

"She (Goodman) inspires her graduate-student colleagues to better teaching, as well as directs students to become more thoughtful writers," said John Gage, director of composition.

Oregon Hall nets innovation praise
