Land sales challenged

MEDFORD — The Oregon Natural Resources Council has challenged the U.S. Bureau of Land Management's plans to sell surplus land in Oregon.

In an appeal to the Interior Board of Land Appeals, the Eugene-based environmental group contends BLM has failed to follow Congressional guidelines in determining the land is not suited to federal use.

"What Congress is saying is that if you go through the process and determine they are surplus or unmanageable, you can sell it," said Andy Kerr, a spokesman for the council.

"But you have to go through the process," he added. "The process they (BLM) are going through is a mere shadow of what congress intended."

Kerr said BLM has failed to undertake a detailed study of whether 270,000 acres of land targeted for sale can be economically managed and has not subjected the information to public review.

BLM officials said they have followed regulations set out in the Federal Land Policy and Management Act and will continue to hold the sales.

BLM's Medford district offered two 40-acre parcels in northern Jackson County for sale last week, but none of the dozen people at the auction entered a bid. BLM refused to accept any bids below the assessed fair market value of the land.

White avoids fed charges

SAN FRANCISCO — Dan White, convicted of killing San Francisco Mayor George Moscone and Supervisor Harvey Milk, won't be tried on federal charges of violating the men's civil rights, federal officials said Monday.

"The evidence is manifestly insufficient to establish that Dan White violated" the civil rights of Moscone and Milk, said Stephen Trott, an assistant U.S. attorney.

White is scheduled to be freed from prison in January after serving five years of a seven-year sentence. His release has prompted protests.

Moscone and Milk were gunned down in City Hall on Nov. 27, 1978,

by then-Supervisor White, a former policeman and fireman.

A jury found White, 37, guilty of voluntary manslaughter.

San Franciscans outraged that White was not found guilty of murder, particularly supporters of Milk, the city's first openly homosexual supervisor, have sought to keep White in prison or have him tried on the federal charges.

Hijacker captured

CHICAGO — A man who said he had a bomb commandeered a Republic Airlines DC-9 Monday and demanded to speak to the Rev. Jesse Jackson, but was taken into custody while the plane was en route to Chicago from Kalamazoo, Mich., police said.

The man was in custody shortly after 2 p.m., said Patrolman Louis Schatz of the Chicago Police Department unit stationed at O'Hare International Airport.

The man took over Flight 275 at Kalamazoo Municipal Airport, and remained aboard as the plane took off for its planned destination of Chicago, said Walt Hellman, a spokesman for the airline in Minneapolis.

It was not immediately known whether the man was actually carrying a bomb, Schatz said.

The Kalamazoo airport was evacuated shortly after the incident occurred, said Margo Mills, an administrative assistant to the Kalamazoo police chief. She did not know how many people were at the airport.

Kohl pledges arms support

BONN — Thousands of anti-nuclear activists defied riot squads firing water jets Monday, and marched outside Parliament as the government reaffirmed its pledge to deploy new U.S. missiles.

Several thousand police sealed off streets around the Bonn Parliament building with steel barriers and prevented more than 4,000 protesters from approaching closer than 100 yards during the debate.

Bonn police spokesman Ernst Doering said police arrested 163 demonstrators by evening as the predominantly youthful crowd repeatedly attempted to block a thoroughfare on the edge of the government district.

Reporters said riot police fired jets of water laced with tear gas into hundreds of demonstrators. At least one protester was reported injured by chemical mace sprayed in his face.

Some demonstrators hurled stones and bags of paint at police, but no serious injuries were reported.

Chancellor Helmut Kohl, opening a parliamentary debate on the medium-range missiles, said some of the weapons would be operational on German soil "by year's end" unless U.S. and Soviet negotiators in Geneva break their deadlock.

"We are not wanderers between East and West," Kohl said. "Between democracy and dictatorship there is no middle road. We stand on the side of freedom."

The debate, scheduled to end Tuesday night with a vote, is considered largely symbolic because Kohl's conservatives have a 58-seat majority and are determined to approve the deployment. Kohl had agreed to the debate because of public pressure.

He said the Soviet Union must not be allowed "to intimidate Western Europeans, to limit our political freedom of action and to separate us from the U.S.A."

West Germany is to receive 204 of the 572 Pershing 2 and cruise missiles that the North Atlantic Treaty Organization has decided to install in Western Europe starting next month. Britain, Italy, the Netherlands and Belgium will get the rest. The British already have received some cruise missiles.

NATO says the weapons will counter hundreds of Soviet multi-warhead SS-20s already deployed and trained on West European targets.

Clark takes oath of office

WASHINGTON — Former national security adviser William Clark was sworn in Monday, in a private ceremony, to succeed James Watt as secretary of the interior.

At a ceremony in the Oval Office, Clark took the oath of office from Attorney General William French Smith. It was witnessed by President Reagan, White House counselor Edwin Meese III, chief of staff James Baker III, Vice President George Bush and Mrs. Clark.

White House spokesman Larry Speakes said that Clark "wanted to be sworn in privately and quickly." He was confirmed by the Senate last Friday.
