Faby's main responsibility with the U.N. is to monitor North American environmental developments and coordinate agencies dealing with environmental concerns.

Thursday's keynote speaker is Greta Goldenman, information director for the Institute of Food and Development Policy. Goldenman will speak in Room 167 EMU at 8 p.m.

Congressman Jim Weaver will help close campus activities Friday with an address on environmental issues of the Pacific Northwest. That evening, Denzel and Nancy Ferguson, caretakers of the Malheur National Wildlife Refuge in Eastern Oregon, will lecture on "Sacred Cows at the Public Trough."

Weaver will speak at 12:30 p.m. in Room 167 EMU and the Fergusons will be in the same room at 8 p.m.
